With fixtures in full swing it has been a real job keeping up with the amount of cricket being played! But that can only be for the good. Already there have been a few surprise results, plenty of excellent individual performances and, thankfully, mainly dry days to enjoy our game. As we go fully into the first round of Cup matches - National K/O, T20s and Cheshire Cup alongside the league fixtures and junior competitions - it will be a very busy period. I have been focusing on scoring duties during these first few

weeks and it has given me chance to reflect on just how far the game has come in a relatively short time. From a scorer's perspective this is especially true - technology has made life a lot easier when it works, and a lot more stressful when it doesn't - if you have become totally reliant on it, that is! But despite all the possibilities, some clubs are still struggling to find scorers. I was checking through all the fines levied by the County League in 2021 - roughly £2.500 in total - and some £1100 of that was for 1st XI clubs not having a scorer, which is a considerable sum. It's a situation I would hope is not repeated although, judging from the conditions that many scorers are expected to operate in, it's hardly surprising. Speaking of those fines, the most common reason in 2021 was the failure to submit umpires marks, with approximately 60 fines being issued. Again, with technology making it so much easier to take on this small piece of postmatch admin, I do wonder why it crops up so often. I've already noticed a considerable number of 'unsure' entries on Play Cricket scorecards too - and quite apart from the potential of clubs receiving a fine, touch with corrections. there are safeguarding implications to

consider. All umpires recently received a reminder about ensuring team cards are correctly completed in all circumstances and it is worth remembering that team sheets need to be completed for all games (not just panel appointed umpires). It's the kind of thing that's too easy for clubs to assume "we'll be okay, there's never been an issue"...and then, guess what. Hopefully as we go into this particularly intense part of the season, there will be a minimal number of these types of problems.

Any number of apologies are due after the April edition. I omitted to note Nigel Muirhead's 5-64 for Toft against Didsbury on the opening day, and I was also corrected by a number of people regarding the result of the Stockport Georgians/Oxton Cheshire Cup match, which was won by Oxton on super over (not fewer wickets lost as stated). There was also an erroneous list of fixtures published for the Cheshire Shield but hopefully this did not cause undue confusion. My thanks to all those who got in

# **CCCL PREMIER DIVISION**



#### MAY 7

An amazing day in the Prem saw two shock wins, two sides bowled out for 99, a high scoring draw and a dramatic local derby. This latter event occurred at Oxton, where Andy Crick hit the last ball for four to give the hosts a nail-biting two wkt win over local rivals **Neston**. Jack Corran had earlier taken 5-44, with the everreliable Chris Stenhouse taking 3-53 from 17 overs, before coming to the rescue with the bat, his 36, along with 58 from Jack Smith, enabling the match to reach its thrilling conclusion. This left Oxton on their own at the top of the table, as the other two sides with 50 points at the start of the day, Hyde and current champs Nantwich, shared the spoils in a high scoring match at Werneth Low. 140 off 138 balls from Marcus Stables powered the Dabbers to 291-7, but Hyde again enjoyed a fruitful opening stand, Tom Partridge and Luke Young adding 92, before **Ray Doyle** led the fightback with the ball as Hyde finished 204-7. Both these sides remained unbeaten, although **Didsbury** moved into third after an emphatic 102 run win at Chester BH. Shorn of several regular first teamers (including captain Nick Anderson), Dids confounded all expec-

tations at a ground where they average 4 pts a visit, racking up 299-7 after being put in, Charlie Lowen (73) and Lewis Bramley (68) adding 124 for the 4th wkt. Called up from the 2nd XI, Raza Mian returned 5-26 as the visitors claimed a notable 25 points. Equally astonishing was Brooklands' 78 run win over Bowdon not so much the margin, but the fact that the hosts had been bowled out for a meagre 116. A J Hart and Rob Leach then caused havoc. Bowdon's first four batters all out for 0, and the scoreboard reading 1-5. Skipper Matt Tully made 3 off 32 before his dismissal left Bowdon 13-7, finally folding for just 38. Another batting struggle at Moss Lane saw a last wkt stand of 35 take Toft to 99: they had **Alderley Edge** 4-3 early on but another classy knock from George Bell got AE over the line. Speaking of classy knocks, Rob Sehmi's 128\* led OP to an easy win over Widnes, who were soon 21-5 chasing 229 and all out 99.

# **MAY 14**

Oxton continued their expectationexceeding start by topping the division after a fourth straight win, and like the week previous it was another tight two wkt triumph as hosts Bowdon struggled to 178-6. Oxton found it equally hard going, slumping to 15-4, but an adhesive Johnny Crick (53 off 147) added 100 with Jack Breheny, before Chris Stenhouse repeated his batting heroics of wk 3, Oxton winning with 7 balls to spare. It took the Townfield Lane club until June 12th to pass 100 pts in 2021, and having been deprived of the services of Joe Mennie by Lancs call ups, it's been an amazing effort. A sparkling 70 from Tim Hughes guided Didsbury to successive wins as they beat OP by 5 wkts. Rob Jones' 105 for Toft was eclipsed by 106\* from the in-form Luke Young (who also took 3-49) as Hyde knocked off the 215 needed only 3 down. Alex Money made a dazzling 90\* out of 144 as CBH won at Nantwich, while an unbroken stand of 107 between Sam Perry (78\*) and Richard Wilkinson (59\*) helped AE to an excellent 6 wkt win at Neston. **Brooklands** made it successive wins, 93 from Dan O'Gorman the ballast in 234-8 at Widnes, who were well placed in reply at 168-3 before they lost 7-45, all out 213.

A generally low scoring day in Div 1, three drawn matches, and no side passing 240. The highest total came at Upcast Lane where Lindow's Johan Wessels continued his purple patch, making 89 off 94, which, allied with a run-a-ball 49 from skipper Alex Matthews, set Bramhall 236 to win, Nick Cantello's 65 was the mainstay of the reply, with Ashley West contributing a valuable 47 to add to his earlier 3-53 as the visitors closed on 223-6, the 35 extras Lindow conceded almost proving very costly. Marple's 207 at Moorside Rd proved to be 29 too many for Urmston to chase, despite 63 from Sumit Panda and 51 from Matt Thomas. Bolly all out 100. An equally encouraging day for Macclesfield saw them beat still winless **Grappenhall** by 4 wkts. Ben Bodha's 60\* helped Grappers recover from 20-4 to post 168-9. Macc were accumulating serenely but lan Hall's 4-22 helped reduce them from 61-0 to 95-5, before veteran John Birchall helped young opener Jack Massey add 69, Macc getting over the line with an over to spare. Elsewhere, Congleton took 13 points from their drawn game at Alvanley, Jack Higginbotham's 75\* off 66 lifting a hitherto stodgy innings upto 196-5. Jarryd Basson made 56 to give Alvanley a sniff but Muhammad Kashif's impressive 8-40 left the hosts clinging on, just surviving on 175-9. Timperley had the better of their draw at Sale, who, despite having 52 overs to chase 216. closed on 170-8.

#### **MAY 14**

Marple's relatively comfortable defence of a modest looking 135 continued their strong start to the season as they beat visitors Macclesfield by 23 runs, topping the table as a result. The hosts didn't last 35 overs as three run outs hobbled them. But a great effort by the six

## MAY 7

A bright and sunny Saturday did not encourage a run-fest in Div 3 but there were six winners come end of play, North East Cheshire making it 3 from 3 after a shuddering Stockport collapse gave them an 83 run win. NEC had been bowled out for a modest looking 142. Mike Eley's 5-34 leading the way for Stockport, who seemed to have steadied an early glitch by getting themselves to 35-3, only for Dave Oldfield's 5-11 to see them lose 7-24, an egregious 59 all out the result. Two wins were by the emphatic margin of 10 wkts, Maritime the earliest finishers after their demolition of Barnton, who limped to just 52 from 33.1 overs, no batsman managing double figures. Vensakar Kanthirai returned 9.1-6-5-5 as Maritime knocked the runs off in under nine overs. Kingsley's big win over visitors Runcorn can't have taken much longer, the hosts racing to 97-0 inside 15 overs, after a mini-revival for the last Runcorn wicket took them from 66-9 to 94. A very different sort of game not so very far away at Barrow, where the division's only century of the day was recorded by the hosts' Matthew Parks, whose splendid 121\*

(103 balls) enabled them to successfully pursue Oakmere's 198-7 (James Hodkinson 51\*). As Barrow reeled at 5-3 in reply. Parks joined Chris Morrison (53), the pair adding 149 for the 4th as Barrow eased home with almost 10 overs in hand. Tattenhall recorded back-toback wins, doing well to defend 145 at Winnington Park, for whom Tom Speak took 5-28. An encouraging show by Tatt then saw WP, who were 56-1, all out for 114. Ashlev's decision to insert visitors Hawk Green seemed fair enough when, despite Elliot Young's 55, HG found themselves a precarious 115 -8, but the last two wkts added what turned out to be a decisive 37 runs. Jack Needham (5-24) and Jason Downey then reduced Ashley to 20-5. The slump slowed, and from 60-8 the Ashley lower order fought hard, but Downey ended the fightback to give HG a 33 run win.

#### **MAY 14**

Although NE Cheshire's 10 wkt demolition of Barnton - in a match which lasted barely 40 overs - sent them top, it was Barrow who took the headlines after a brilliant win at Hawk Green. The long trip east

seemed to have taken the spark out of the visitors as the hosts racked up 244-7, but Matthew Parks continued his fabulous form, reaching a second successive ton by going 6,4,6,6 to power past the target with overs in hand. In all Parks faced 65 bs, and hit 10x4,6x6. Maritime's well paced chase of 223 at Oakmere sent them second (no details available) while Ashley were another side to pull off an impressive away win, theirs a 9 wkt hammering of Tattenhall at The Flacca, Alex Morfitt (52\*) and Harry Hatchell (50\*) adding 103\* for the second wkt after Syed Azam Shah made 65 the 30 extras conceded by Tatt had a significant bearing. At Cale Green **Stockport** won a dramatic encounter with Kingsley by just 7 runs, the hosts managing just 146 after being 91-2, Zafar Jatoi 69. However Kingsley virtually mirrored Stockport in subsiding from 93-2 to 139 all out with plenty of overs unused. Equally dramatic at Runcorn where the hosts overtook Winnington Park's 214-9 with just two balls remaining, Ryan Beech's 90\* (70 bs) the standout.

# 2ND XI CRICKET APRIL ROUND-UP

# PREMIER DIVISION- APRIL

A number of impressive batting displays highlighted the opening day in the Prem, three centurions and some high scoring games. However, it was more bowling highlights in the case of champions' **Didsbury's** comfortable 8 wkt win over **Alderley Edge**, who they dismissed for just 90 to get their season off well. **Chester BH's Reg Wyatt** (right) made 114 as he and **Luke Ramsay** (86) added 174 for the 1st wkt in their resounding win at **Bowdon**, who had no an-



swer to their 257-4, Martin Green taking 4-2 as the hosts were all out 77. Neston's Paddy Brown made a brilliant 123\*, a big partnership with David Manchett (81\*) helping them to an impressive 6 wkt win over Sale, whose earlier 231-4 had Grant Whittaker's 86 as its mainstay. A different sort of ton for Toft's Tom Maddocks, whose unbeaten 104 helped his side claim a tense draw at Nantwich, after the hosts had racked up 251-8. The match featured 60 extras and Toft's last pair surviving as their valiant chase closed on 222-9. Elsewhere on day 1, Cheadle beat Hyde and promoted Oxton found life tougher in the Prem, as they collapsed to 19-7 at Oulton Park. # **BRILLIANT CHESHIRE GO THROUGH**

# CHESHIRE OVERCAME A FRANTIC T20 SCHEDULE TO QUALIFY FOR FINALS DAY AFTER A RUN OF IMPRESSIVE PERFORMANCES. HERE'S A SUMMARY OF THAT PACKED SCHEDULE, AND A DRAMATIC FINALE!

Sun May 1st: It was honours even with Staffs after the May-Day double header at Leek, a brilliant effort in the field restricting the hosts to 124-7 in game one, debutant Charlie Barnard (Hyde) claiming 2-17 in 4 probing overs along with 3 catches. AE's Sam Perry anchored the reply, a super 41 from 29 by Will Evans (C.Bay) and a cameo 20 off 9 from skipper Nick Anderson (Dids) sealing victory with almost 2 overs in hand. Barnard did it again in game two, one of four Cheshire bowlers to claim 2 wkts as Staffs were bowled out for 120. However, Cheshire couldn't get going as Grant Thornton claimed 5-12, slumping to 90 all out.

Mon May 2nd: Cheshire decamped to Toft CC for a double-header with a strong Cumbria team who had both Gary Pratt and Lancs paceman Richard Gleeson. Game one saw Cheshire put into bat, 54 from Perry and 42\* off 26 from CBH's Alex Money lifted the hosts to 147-6. Steve Green (Dids) then got rid of the dangerous Pratt and returned 2-15 as Cumbria were restricted to 130-8. Having had their games the day before washed out, it was thought that the visitors might take advantage of a tiring Cheshire outfit, but in game two the hosts dug deep and reached 135-8, taking 74 off the second half of their innings - although the last over was a double wicket maiden. However, another amazing effort in the field, led by Flowery Field's Michael Finan (3-20) saw Cumbria stutter to 117-9 after 19. A twist threatened when 10 came off the first two balls of the final over, but Hyde's Andrew Jackson, back on familiar territory, held his nerve to concede just three more, and Cheshire were home by 5 runs.

Cheshire, with a highly creditable three wins from four games, were top of NCCA Group 1 heading into their final matches against Northumberland, which involved a considerable journey north on the Saturday evening after a day's league cricket.

Sun May 8th: the well appointed home of the mighty South Northumberland proved very much to Cheshire's liking as the two wins they secured held off a strong challenge from Staffs, who were playing Cumbria on the same day. In game one, Northumberland were restricted to 139-5 after choosing to bat, captain Nick Anderson the main man with 3-25, and to his great delight he was one of nine Cheshire batsman not needed after **Rob Sehmi** (86\*) (pictured in action for OP, right) and Sam Perry (51\*) took them to a thumping 10 wkt win with almost 5 overs unused. Both batters faced 46 balls. Sehmi in particular imperious, hammering 12 x 4 and 3 x 6 on the back of an unbeaten league ton the day before. However, the jubilation was tempered by discovering Staffs had knocked off 107 in just 7.4 overs to beat Cumbria, which meant Cheshire had to win game two to be sure. Northumberland again chose to bat, their 184-1 (Alasdair Appleton a fine 102\*) set an imposing target, but having been 113-1 after 10, it should have been more. Any Cheshire nerves were quickly banished as **Sehmi** and **Perry** put on 81 in just 7.4 overs, Sehmi's 53 off 25 (which took his personal boundary tally for the day to 19x4 and 5x6) the catalyst for some dazzling stroke-



play as **Harry Dearden** (26 off 18) and **Will Evans** (36\* off 15) accompanied **Sam Perry**, 63\* off 54, ending the match with a six to complete the remarkable feat of being on the field for the entirety of the two matches.

Along with the rest of the team, Sehmi must be an automatic choice for finals day (sorry Jim!) which takes place at Tring CC (Herts) on Sun May 22nd. Cheshire will face Oxfordshire in s/f 1 (10.00 am start, if you please!) with Dorset taking on Cambs in s/f 2.
