On July 2 I was fortunate to umpire at Sale when they took on Urmston. A match played in an excellent spirit throughout, it turned into a fantastic game, Sale finishing one run shy of a rare level scores draw after a dramatic last over. Amidst all the tension, however, Urmston ended up going over their allotted time for their overs. Now, we had to take time to replace balls (one split and two were irretrievably lost), a fielder copped one in the jaffas, batters needed drinks on a warm evening, a couple of times I had to confer with the scorers - so we could find reasons which covered the excess time. It wasn't as though either side

were deliberately slowing the game down the mounting tension as both sides responded to the situation, fielders being precisely positioned, instructions being repeated, batters agreeing tactics - all of these things were going on, but nobody minded. Light and weather weren't a problem, and as I say, we had a gripping finish. Cricketers don't get to be involved in these kinds of games very often, and neither do officials! However, on another day, this game could have seen sides get into bother with time penalties and points deductions, which would have been a real shame. So the vote and subsequent decision regarding time allowances for matches is a welcome one. As of now, 110 over games will see an allowance of 3 hr 35 per inns, and a 3 hr 15 allowance in 100 over cricket. Both these time allowances include one stoppage for drinks, although how long such an interval lasts is largely down to the fielding side. Further allowances (e.g. retrieving balls, injuries etc) will be determined by the standing umpires as necessary. Teams face a 1 pt deduction for every 3 mins 30 secs over their allowance they go. Over rates have been a source of angst amongst clubs for some years, although it has always escaped me as to why this should be so. Slow play is a blight on our game (as it

is in other sports, such as golf) and deserves to be penalised as such. And we are entering the second half of our season when fading light is more likely to cause issues in matches going the distance, so tardy over rates need addressing. However, with these new timings being introduced, it is hoped we will find a 'middle ground' where play proceeds at the stipulated rate of 17 overs per hour but sides are not rushing unduly. Personally I welcome these amendments to our playing conditions. And of course, the quicker a team bowls its overs, the more benefit they attain. It exerts more pressure on the batting side seeing the overs clicking by rapidly, and it keeps the fielding side buoyed, energetic and alert. And you get off the field quicker! Hopefully we will have far fewer issues with over rates and the pace of play as the various divisions start really taking shape. And more games like Sale v Urmston wouldn't go amiss either!

ps I was also fortunate to witness Andrew Jackson's extraordinary T20 innings in late June - do check the detail of it later in this newsletter.

### THE SPIRIT OF CRICKET - LAW 42

Following on from the feature in the last newsletter about the oft-discussed 'spirit of the game', and how it is defined within the actual laws, it is worth looking in more detail at how we can all act both within the law and the spirit on matchday. Many are now aware that Law 42 ('Unfair Play') was specifically redrafted in the 2017 revision to empower umpires to deal with incidents of poor behaviour, starting with Level 1 for actions

42.2.1 Any of the following actions by a player shall constitute a Level 1 offence:

 wilfully mistreating any part of the cricket ground, equipment or implements used in the match

 showing dissent at an umpire's decision by word or action

- using language that, in the circumstances, is obscene, offensive or insulting

- making an obscene gesture
- appealing excessively

- advancing towards an umpire in an aggressive manner when appealing

- any other misconduct, the nature of which is, in the opinion of the umpires, equivalent to a Level 1 offence. deemed unacceptable (but not serious in themselves), upto Level 4, covering occurrences which are also potentially criminal. The list of Level 1 offences opposite are typically the most commonly encountered - most players will recognise themselves at some stage! Umpires also have a duty to use 'cricketing sense' - recognising that an appeal that is upheld or declined is likely to provoke some sort of reaction, before wading in with sanctions. But we can also infer that acting in the opposite way to the behaviours listed is in fact also playing within the spirit of the game; so, for example, only appealing when there is a genuine conviction that the batter is out; being selective about the language we choose to use; not booting a boundary marker in frustration when leaving the field after dismissal these are ways in which players can uphold both the letter and the spirit. And although there will inevitably be examples where such self-control is not in evidence, there are many examples of captains and players actively adopting a positive approach towards the spirit of the game.

#### WK 11 - JULY 2ND

Hyde made it six straight wins, easing clear at the top with an emphatic triumph at Bowdon, almost identical to their hammering of Neston the week previous. The struggling hosts were quickly all over the place at 9-5 after 11 overs and only some determined lower order resistance from Alex Makin (47) and Joe Chapple (30), plus a last wkt stand of 43, gave the score a hint of respectability. As it was, Tom Partridge (78\*) and Luke Young (53\*) knocked off the 134 needed inside 22 overs, to go with a 126 opening stand seven days ago. Of the chasing pack, **Didsbury** drew their game with Nantwich at Wilmslow Rd, the visitors reaching 223-9 and Dids replying with 178-8 - half centuries for Spencer Byatt and James Green, with five wkt hauls for Steve Green and Olly Griffiths. Alderley Edge won a third game in a row after a 42 run victory at Brooklands, Sam Perry's 93 the key contribution in their 217-8, captain **Charlie Reid** chipping in with a 14-ball 30 before taking 4-46. Chester BH also kept their revival on track with a comprehensive 8 wkt win at Neston. Rowan Shelton (58\*) and Luke Jones (39) added 72 for the 8th wkt as the hosts got to 191-9 off their allocation.

but an opening stand of 128 in 25 overs between Rick Moore (77) and Lee Dixon (73) effectively settled the outcome. Two teams on poor runs of form drew their encounter, Oulton Park taking 14 pts away from Oxton after Rob Sehmi (100) and Danny Leech (78) put on 145 for the 3rd wkt, OP finishing on 231-4. Didsbury got a first win in three thanks to a ton from Aussie Noah Croes (103\*), his unbroken psp with Marcus Fisher (53\*) worth 155 as Dids beat Toft by 9 wkts. Chester BH made it four in a row with a comprehensive 8 wkt win at Bowdon, who despite the appearance of Glen Chapple, could only reach 200-8, Glen's son Joe making 48 and Matt Tully 45\* at no.9. A super 107 (101 bs) from Warren Goodwin and 59 from Alex Money saw CBH home with bags of overs in hand, their psp 138 for the 2nd wkt. An opening stand of 104 in 31 overs between Ed Foster and Sam Perry seemed to set AE up for a big score at Nantwich, Perry making 130, but the hosts fought back to restrict AE to 225. In early strife at 24-3, Luke Robinson (101\*) and Spencer Byatt (83\*) put on an unbroken 204 for the 4th, Robinson reaching his ton with a 6 as Nantwich won in the 43rd over. Oulton Park's poor run continued, losing by 7 wkts at Neston. Two sides who haven't tasted victory since May drew. Jordan Collier making 54\* and taking 3-63 as Oxton held on against Brooklands, for whom AJ Hart took 5-21 and Todd Walker made 68.

#### WK 11 - JULY 2

Cheadle's march towards an immediate return to the Premier Division continued apace with a 135 run demolition of Marple at Kingsway, the visitors losing their fifth game in a row as their bright start to 2022 continued to fade. Three half-centuries (Nick Reid, Ben Marsden and Dan Brown) took the hosts to 250-7. Brown was one of four bowlers amongst the wkts as Marple struggled to 115. Grappenhall's eighth consecutive win put them second, Aaron McCabe taking 5-36 as they bowled Congleton out for 108 before Albert Pennington's 50 off 34 took the match to a rapid conclusion. Sale stayed third after a thrilling finish to their drawn game at Dane Rd with Urmston, Reduced to 45 overs a side. the visitors reached 226-5. Lewis Jackson's 60 the leading contribution. Sale replied with an opening stand of 128 which seemed to be setting them up nicely, but despite Pat Ashling's brilliance (149\*) the chase faltered as wickets fell, with 10 needed off the last over. A tiring Ashling played an audacious flick over fine leg for six off the third ball but couldn't connect as well with the other five, Sale finishing one short of a tie after consecutive run outs. Lindow got an encouraging

win over bottom side Bollington, who made a curious 182-4 in their allocation with Ben Gibson finishing 106\*. Despite losing a wkt first ball, Lindow needed less than 33 overs to overtake their target. Ryan O'Brien making 87 and Johan Wessels 54\*. An unbroken stand of 98 for the 3rd wkt between Greg Dixon (61\*) and the inform Nick Cantello (56\*) took Bramhall to a valuable 8 wkt win at Alvanley. An even bigger 3rd wkt stand of 168 between Jamie Matthews (114) and Johan Harms (90) took Timperley to a whacking 274-5 against Macclesfield, for whom Jack Mattson's 64 almost saved them after they lost 5-7 midinnings, Mattson last man out in the 51st as Timpers won by 57 runs, their third win in four games.

their ninth in a row by 5 wkts over Urmston in an unspectacular match, Peter Barnes' 61\* the standout as they reached their 141 target in the 32nd over. Very different at Lindow where three batters (Ryan O'Brien, Max Law, Johan Wessels) all passed 50 for the hosts, who ran up 248-4 against Sale. Pat Ashling (70) Tyrone Lawrence & Dan Newton (52 apiece) mirrored that feat to help Sale home in the 46th - they are now upto third. Timperley made it four wins out of five as they racked up 278-6 (dec) in 49 against Alvanley, Jonathan Fletcher 105\*. Alv almost escaped with a draw, the last wkt falling with three balls remaining as they were all out 217. Another last over finish at Booth St as Marple got a welcome first win in six with a narrow 2 wkt win over Congleton, who were 85-0 in the 19th but all out 215. Marple were also well placed at 93-0 in the 18th but a nervy scrap ensued before Joe Cash hit a six to settle it. The battle of the bottom two at the start of play went decisively the way of Bramhall, Greg Dixon 92\* as they completed a comprehensive 8 wkt win over Bollington.

#### WK 11 - JULY 2

Port Sunlight captain Simon Melberzs led a remarkable recovery as they hosted leaders Stockport Georgians. Coming in on a hat-trick, Melberzs rescued his side from the early calamity of 11-3 with an unbeaten 97 as the last three PS wkts added 138 to set SG 199 to win. The in-form Ned Bailey fell to his first ball which set the tone for an unusually subdued SG batting display, Simon Normanton's patient 55 the best as SG just could not build momentum, the last pair surviving a nervous final over to finish 173-9. Another captain leading by example is Davenham's Sam Hunt, his fourth consecutive half century the standout as his side made 163-8 at second place Romiley. The hosts were made to work for the points, however, the mid-lower order keeping calm at 122-6 to secure a 3 wkt win. Cheadle Hulme stayed third after beating Hale Barns at Grove Park, the hosts making 176 (Adam Wilde 52). HB reached 91-1 in the 21st but an horrendous collapse saw them 119-9 just 15 overs later, and an eventual 135 all out. That result left HB bottom of a fascinating table - they were, notionally, one win away from going fifth, so tight are things in Div 2. Another

good day at Badrock house, twins David (51\*) and James (40\*) putting together an unbroken 4th wkt stand to see Romiley safely home against Hale Barns, Alex Hooton earlier taking 6-32 for the home side as HB were bowled out for 167. Haslington recovered from 13-2 to post 262-7 against Christleton. Jack Taylor making 74, Ben Istead 56, Joe Goodier 52\*. A ninth win out of 11 saw North East Cheshire cement their lead in Div 3. Winnington Park not detaining them unduly as they fell from 76-4 to 112 all out, Dave Oldfield taking 5-16. Captain Jake Reynolds hit 56 off 59 as NEC won by 6 wkts within 31 overs. Vensakar Kanthirai continued his good form with 83\* as Maritime made 237-6 against Kingsley. Hakeem Rauf then took 5-15 as Kingsley looked on the brink at 49-7. but a superb rearguard by Dom Freer Carmichael (72) and Patrick Phelan (36) saw 115 added for the 8th in some 30 overs. Phelan there at the close as his side finished 170-8. Ashley got themselves to 142-2 in the 28th batting first at Stockport but the hosts fought back well, Ashley closing on 197-9, but this still proved out of Stockport's reach as capt. Sabtain Baig took 5 wkts and ran out Naveed Gondal. Ben Perry's 57 was the mainstay of the hosts' 180-9 as the match finished in a tense draw. It was even more on a knife-edge at Oakmere where visitors Hawk Green scrambled a 1 wkt win after bowling the hosts out for 137, the HG last pair just doing enough to get their team over the

# 2ND XI CRICKET APRIL ROUND-UP

### PREMIER DIVISION - July 2 & 9

Didsbury and Chester BH opened up a 50+ point gap on the rest after big wins for both on July 2. Despite losing in-form Stuart Stoneman second ball, the next five Didsbury batters scored 39, 48, 51, 46, and 64\* (Sam Youds) which along with 26 extras took them to 281-5 and an eventual 165 run win at Toft as Youds returned 4-31. CBH recorded an 8 wkt win over Oxton at Filkins Lane, Will Clayton making 70 for the visitors as they were all out 173. Matthew Griffiths (47) and Matt Hodges (95) laid the foundation with a big opening stand, Hodges perishing trying to hit a 6 for his ton, but the game was won in the 42nd over. The battle between third and fourth went the way of Nantwich, eight double figure scores taking them to a healthy 246 against Neston, who fell in a bit of a heap to be all out 115. Alderley Edge got a first win in four, beating Cheadle by 6 wkts. A fifth wkt stand of 103 helped Oulton Park total 179 against Sale, for whom lan Habershon took 5-22 before biffing a useful 34, one of five double figure contributions as Sale won by 3 wkts. The meeting of the bottom two at Werneth Low went the way of Hyde - but only just. Visitors Bowdon went from 133-6 to 147 all out in 48 overs, but that seemed like plenty when captain Haydn George (7-24) tore into the Hyde batting, his left-arm pace reducing them to 36-7 after 21 overs. Hri Nath counterattacked with 46 off 43 as Jamie Richardson (39\* off 108) provided the

#### CHESTER BH (201-2) beat Maritime (95) by 106 runs


