FROM THE EDITOR



Another beautifully warm and dry month comes to an end and so much remains up for grabs. As ever, it seems to have gone by quite quickly, but there has been plenty of good cricket at all levels to enjoy, and it remains something of a frustra tion of mine that there is only so

much space and time that the newsletter can give to reflecting all that is going on. Enjoying an U13s match recently on a lovely evening at my club, with the barbeque in high demand and a good crowd gathered was another reminder of how much work is put in by so many, at so many clubs, to enable younger players to enjoy the game. Some clubs - but only a minority - publicise their junior achievements, as well as all the other goings-on, effectively and regularly, but the majority still lack a meaningful presence online and I remain as convinced as ever that this one aspect that many clubs miss out on in terms of potential recruitment and retention of members. It's easier than ever to update a twitter feed or website, and also to use photographs

and other media to celebrate great achievements. One media presence that is strong is that of Nantwich, who deserve great credit in reaching another Lords final, their fixtures being squashed into the final few weeks of the season as a result. Earlier in the year Alderley Edge almost got through in the national T20s, Alvanley got a good way into the national Village Cup, while Cheshire County came through an exhausting season to look back on all their feats in the three formats with pride. With the ECB apparently concluding in their recently released 'review' that there needs to be less domestic cricket played it will be interesting to see how that impacts the NCCA side of the game, and women's cricket, which was not included in this initial review. As you may be aware, 'the Hundred' is exempt from any such review and is apparently set in stone for many years to come, and although I personally have no interest in it as a format or as potential viewing, it

can only be a matter of time before county boards are being asked to find time in the calendar to schedule a '100' competition - indeed, it's already a format being tried at junior level. It will be interesting to see what if anything is received as a proposal during the close-season for debate amongst clubs, as it will also to see if there is any consensus reached on a split-format league season (half of 1st XI games 'timed', the other half win/lose) as has been mooted previously. As all the competitions reach their conclusions there is still much up for grabs, and we can only hope the weather remains as kind as the natural daylight ebbs away that bit quicker. The best of good fortune to all those battling away at summit, and foot! The final newsletter of the season will be published shortly after the last weekend of September 17-18.

CHESHIRE CC NEWS

AMAZING TURNAROUND SECURES DIV 1 STATUS

After two disappointing results in their championship fixtures which left Cheshire staring at the prospect of relegation, Cheshire's match against leaders Berkshire at Nantwich in mid-August assumed even greater im-

portance. Rob Sehmi made 108, Andrew Jackson a rapid 93* and David wainwright 89 as Cheshire made 451-8 in their first inns. Berkshire replied with 334-9, then Cheshire, batting again made 220 in some 85 overs, all but ensuring a draw. However, Berkshire's steady second inns was shaken up by losing 3 wkts in 5 balls and Cheshire sensed an opening; after Jackson (8-4-8-3) had done his part, Wainwright (10-5-17-3) and



Andrew Dufty (11.2-10-2-4) induced an astonishing collapse, Dufty with the final wicket (pictured above) as Cheshire puled off a stunning 253 run win deep into the last hour.

Spirits were much higher in the Cheshire camp as they made the long journey south to take on Dorset at Wimborne, and a series of solid knocks (Nick Anderson 88*, Rob Sehmi 73, Ali Chugtai 64 the highlights) helped



Cheshire to a stout 385-8 in their first innings. Dorset, needing a win to survive, replied with 357-9 but with poor weather taking time out of the game, Henry Dobson (87) and Sehmi again (60) ensured a draw which meant Cheshire finished a creditable third in the Division (Dorset were relegated, however).

THE STATE OF PLAY

Your at-a-glance summary of the key issues in each 1st XI division as the season comes to a close

PREMIER DIVISION

The top flight is neatly split into three groups of four: four teams could potentially be champions (Hyde, Nantwich, Didsbury, Alderley Edge); two of four will be relegated (Bowdon, Toft, Brooklands, Oulton Park) while the other four are mid-table.

DIVISION ONE

Grappenhall need 3 more points to assure promotion, Cheadle another 17; either side could still go up as champions. At the foot, any two of seven sides - Lindow, Bramhall, Alvanley, Urmston, Macclesfield, Marple, Bollington - could be relegated.

DIVISION TWO

Stockport Georgians and Romiley are favourites to be promoted with SG more likely to do so as champions. Mobberley could also go up but are dependant on other results. At the foot, two of Upton, Warrington or Hale Barns are most likely to be relegated.

DIVISION THREE

North East Cheshire are favourites to gain promotion, with one of Maritime, Stockport or Hawk Green joining them. At the foot, either Tattenhall or Runcorn will go down along with already-relegated Barnton.

GAMES TO WATCH OUT FOR IN SEPTEMBER

PREMIER DIV: Hyde's run-in sees them take on Oxton (h), Neston (a) and Bowdon (h); three wins will be the most straightforward way to seal what would be a third Premier Division title and a first since 2015 at Werneth Low. Didsbury and Nantwich's potentially crucial game has been moved from the last day to Sun. 4th due to the scheduling of the National Club Final (see final page) so both clubs will have a double header weekend - Dids taking on Widnes (h) and Nantwich entertaining Bowdon before travelling to Widnes on the 10th, when Didsbury welcome Alderley Edge, who are the other side well within title range. AE's fixture run-in will also have a significant bearing on the battle to avoid the drop, as they entertain both Oulton Park and Brooklands in their final three games. Sept 10th will be a tense day for all four sides at the foot, Bowdon visiting Toft and Oulton Park travelling to Brooklands.

DIV 1: Grappers travel to Kingsway on Sept 10th for the game of the day in the division, but at the foot there are many permutations. Marple entertain Bramhall in a critical game on the 3rd, travel to Timperley on the 10th, and then play Cheadle, so their fixtures are testing ones; Lindow's last three games are against clubs also scrapping to stay up - Macclesfield (a), Alvanley (h), then Bollington (a). Bramhall themselves host Macclesfield after their trip to Marple, before their game at Alvanley on the last day, when Macc take on Timperley at Victoria Rd. Alvanley's other Sept fixture is on the 3rd against Sale. Urmston have also slumped at the wrong time and need a win.

DIV 2: Georgians travel to Romiley on the 10th in the division's game of the day; Georgians have Port Sunlight and Haslington to play, while Romiley face Cheadle Hulme and finish at Davenham. At the foot, none of the struggling sides play each other in Sept although both Upton and Warrington have Mobberley to take on.

DIV 3: NE Cheshire entertain Maritime on the 10th in a crunch match; Stockport travel to Hawk Green on the 3rd and then play Tattenhall and Ashley; Hawk Green have Barnton and Oakmere to play. Tattenhall welcome Runcorn on the 3rd in a big game for both clubs.



CCCL PREMIER DIVISION



WK 18 - AUGUST 20

Oxton's revival, which has all but assured their place in the Premier Division, reached a new high after they claimed a dramatic last ball win at champions Nantwich in undoubtedly the result of the day. After the drama of their tie the previous week, Oxton's third win in four was courtesy of their highest total of the season - and in fact, the first time they passed 200 in the league in 2022 - as Henry Dobson's superb 131* (144 bs) and a 3rd wkt psp of 129 in some 32 overs with Matt Jones (65) as Oxton totalled 275-8. Nantwich replied fluently enough but fell from 51-0 to 63-3, before Marcus Stables found support in the middle order. However, when Stables was run out for 52, hopes of victory faded. and in a tense finale, Jack Corran bowled **Mitchell Spencer** with the last ball of the match to seal a 28 run win. The result saw Nantwich down to fourth after the top three all won, leaders Hyde overcoming struggling Oulton Park by 5 wkts to stay out in front. OP opted to bat at Werneth Low but were suffocated by the relentless home attack, only Rob Sehmi's two and a half hour stay for 72 at least meaning some batting pts were claimed. Another strong opening stand between Messers Partridge and Young (86 in 17.2 os) set the platform for win no.13 of the season. Didsbury kept up the pressure with a fourth win in five games. Noah Croes hitting an accomplished 106* (87 bs), he and **Tim Hughes** (50) putting on 105 for the 1st to pave the way for a comfortable 7 wkt win over an under-strength Neston side who lost their last 5 wkts for 24, 197 all out the result. Alderley Edge also remained very much in the hunt after their impressive league form continued, beating Chester BH by a resounding 8 wkts at Moss Lane. Richard Wilkinson took 5-51 to see the visitors 220 all out, a disappointment after **Rick Moore** (68) and Alex Money (50) had guided them to 104-1 after 24 os. In reply, Ed Fos**ter** (87*) and **Sam Perry** (43) added 94 for starters before Foster and Archie Vaughan (70) added 126 for the 2nd to seal 25 pts for the twelfth time this season. At the foot of the table it was an especially bad day for Toft who were left pointless after a nine wkt hammering by visitors Brooklands, AJ Hart rampant with 7-29 as the hosts were bowled out for just 77, Todd Walker hitting 51 as Brooklands won within 47 overs of playing time. The gloom at Booths Park was deepened further as news of **Bowdon's** dramatic two run win at Widnes came through, which renewed hopes of survival at South Downs Rd. Ross Zelem hit a superb 121 off 120 bs. but he was out with the score 219-2. which led to a shuddering collapse as Bowdon were dismissed for 240, Tom Evans with 5-42. Half centuries from Kieran Maher and Luke McCoy kept things ticking for Widnes but wkts kept tumbling too, McCov ninth out at 229. The last pair edged towards the target before Rob Lord bowled Evans to pull off a famous win for Bowdon. WK 19 - AUGUST 27

All the top four clubs won, three of them by 6 wkts, as the title race hotted up. Hyde's 6 wkt win at Brooklands was the most straightforward, Andrew Jackson's 6-51 leaving his side just 116 to chase, which they did without too much trouble.

Bowdon were praising the Lord after all-rounder Rob made a fantastic 153* (141 bs) helping his side hammer 96 from the last 10 and set Didsbury 256 to win at South Downs Rd. Tim

Hughes (43) and Noah Croes

(111) made it successive centu-

ry opening stands as they added

118 in 19 overs, Croes making it



back-to-back tons as a series of solid knocks saw Dids to victory in the 47th over. A rare wicketless spell by Phil Stockton was of no consequence to Nantwich as Mitchell Spencer's 6-35 saw Neston crumble from 176-2 (Luke Jones 75, Dane Williams 63) to 200 all out. Fifties from Marcus Stables and Spencer Byatt - and 37 extras saw Nantwich cruise home inside 30 overs. Ed Foster (110) and Sam Perry (57) put on 127 as AE pursued Widnes' 249-8 at Beaconsfield Rd, although what looked like a walk in the park became a very tense last over win for AE by just 2 wkts as the hosts fought back hard. A runfest at Townfield Lane saw almost 600 runs scored, Oxton making light of their batting struggles this season with a massive 349-2 dec against a bruised Toft attack. Luke Filer (163 off 182) and Joe Mennie (96 off 104) each played superb knocks, adding 240 for the 1st in good time. O'Shay Reddy's 80 led the determined Toft response, as they just held on at 239-9 to claim a vital 5 pts. Despite a wonderful 147* from Oulton Park's Rob Sehmi, a Chester BH batting display of yore saw them make light work of a daunting 286 target as Alex Money (83). Rick Moore (73) and James Duffy (69) eased the visitors home by 6 wkts in the 46th over. All of which meant the bottom four were separated by just 7 pts at the end of another amazing day.

CCCL DIVISION ONE



WK 18 - AUGUST 20

Leaders **Grappenhall** were in the unusual situation of battling to stave off defeat on match day 18, after Lindow's Max Law (79) and Gus Watson (70) helped take their team to 230-5 at Broad Lane and set Grappers a testing chase. Youngster Will Espley (5-42) led the visitors attack really well, dismissing key man Grant Hodnett (73) which left Grappers 174-4 in the 41st. Four overs later the board read 188-8 and when Ben Bodha fell for a hard-fought 45, the last pair had to hold on for two uncomfortable overs, which they did as Grappers finished 199-9. Despite this narrow squeak, their three-year absence from the Prem was all but confirmed after Timperley's loss at Cheadle, Grappers needing a handful of points to assure promotion. Cheadle themselves almost there from their remaining matches to ensure an immediate return to the top flight. Will Holmes 5-47 the highlight as they bowled out an unusually subdued Timpers for just 175 at Kingsway. Adam Dooler blazed 98 as he and Ben Marsden (57*) added 139 for the 1st, Cheadle winners by 5 wkts. The main interest in the Division after all of this was at the foot, where any two of six clubs were notionally left staring at relegation, although **Bollington**, despite a heartening 6 wkt derby day win at Macclesfield (Jack Ward 91*, Ben Gibson 68) need a miracle, still 58 pts from safety, while Macc themselves are very much in the relegation dogfight. With Lindow's maximum pts draw it was not a good day for Bramhall to slump as they did at Congleton. Asked to bat, no Cong batter reached 50 but some useful contributions, and 36 extras, saw a total of 189-9 posted. Bramhall's top four were dismissed inside 14 overs and the visitors never recovered, all out 116, meaning a nervous last four games ahead. Alvanley are also right in the mix after a batting seizure at Urmston saw them crash from 65-0 to 118-9, the last pair biffing a few to claim what could be vital batting pts, but 79* from Matt Thomas and a rumbustious 49* from Matt Kilcourse eased the hosts to a 7 wkt win and all but confirm their place in Div 1 for another year. Marple's topsy-turvy season continued with a heavy defeat at home to Sale, Josh Patel taking 5-36 as the hosts could only muster 123, Sale racing to an 8 wkt triumph inside 21 overs. Another game like this - and with their next two games against Lindow and Bramhall - and Marple's end to 2022 could be a very edgy one indeed.....

WK 19 - AUGUST 27and it did indeed come to pass that Marple found Lindow too hot to handle, skipper Alex Matthews with 5-30 at Upcast Lane as they bowled the visitors out for 153, with 60 apiece from Max Law and Charlie Hodge taking Lindow to a 6 wkt win and lifting them out of the bottom three. This was due to another defeat for Bramhall, and although is only a one point cushion from the



Church Lane side, it will do for now. Bramhall came a cropper chasing 161 to beat Grappenhall, losing a wicket off the first ball of their reply and folding for 140. Bramhall's run of one win in five has put added spice into their game at Marple, both sides now shifting uncomfortably but both still well able to escape. As for Grappers, after a 15th win of the season, they need just three more points to guarantee promotion back to the Prem after a three year absence. Cheadle are really well placed for an immediate Prem return after Liam Fitzpatrick's breathtaking 120* (78 bs, 10x4, 10x6) saw them race to a 9 wkt walloping of Urmston, Fitzpatrick helping to add an unbroken 172 for the second wkt in the process as well as taking a wicket earlier too. Urmston are still mathematically involved in the relegation issues but in reality another win should suffice for them. That is far from the case for Macclesfield, who suffered an eleventh reverse of the season and are very much in the thick of it at the wrong end after a hiding at Sale, who knocked off their paltry 113 target in under 20 overs. Pat Ashling hit a run-a-ball 59 which leaves him 14 away for 1,000 league runs, a truly impressive achievement. Alvanley sealed a crucial win for them in a tight squeak at their place, coming out on top against **Bollington** by 15 runs and moving 26 pts away from the drop zone as result. Alv were really in the soup at 128-8 but got the total upto 168. That still seemed inadequate when Rick Hough and Ben Gibson (78 off 88) added 85 for the 1st, but Ben Tumilty and skipper Michael Rowlands each took 5 wkts, Gibson departing at 127-4 and Bolly slumping to 153, now 59 pts from safety and looking doomed. Timperley kept up their hopeful pursuit of the top two with a five wkt win over **Congleton** in an entertaining tussle at Stockport Rd. Jonathan Fowler's 6-60 seeing Cong all out for 191. In reply, Timpers were in a spot of bother at 79-4 but a fine unbeaten 78 from **Ed Galley** helped ensure the 25 pts.

WK 18 - AUGUST 20

It was very much a case of 'as you were' after Saturday's fixtures, with the top three all winning and two of the bottom three losing. Stockport Georgians got themselves properly dusted down after the previous weeks' loss, although a 3 wkt win after chasing just 149 against lowly **Upton** was perhaps not as convincing as they might have hoped, but it was very much a case of 'never mind the quality, feel the points' at Flowery Field. All too familiar batting frailties saw the visitors tumble from 37-0 to 50-5, as Messers Locke and Normanton spun their way through the top order, so 148 was a creditable effort from the tail. However, Georgians' strong batting line up was much less fluent than earlier in the season, Upton causing a few butterflies as they reduced them to 33-4 in reply before Normanton (34) inspired the lower order who cobbled together effective partnerships to seal the win. Romiley kept their grip on second spot with an easy 9 wkt win over **Christleton**, who were back down to earth with a real crash after scoring 270 the week previous, succumbing for just 88 at Birchvale Drive. James Badrock and Mark Flattley took four wkts apiece as the match was concluded within 55 overs. Mobberley remained just about in touch with the top two with their fourth win in a row, this one a 143 run spanking of Davenham, who were initially pleased with their

choice to field first at Butchers' Stile as **Sohaib Butt** (out hit wicket for 0) and Sam Gainsford (5) both fell cheaply, but 76 from Osman Butt and 50s from Matt Mountney and Ibrar Latif enabled Mobb to declare after 46 overs on 254-6. Gainsford then took 4-11 as Davenham folded for just 111. At the other end of the table, Port Sunlight fell in a heap at Hale Barns. After losing a wkt to the first ball of the match, CH recovered with some sparkling strokeplay led by Adam Wilde's 106, but their 280-6 proved beyond AOM's ambitions, as Henry Murray's 90 led their reply of 211-6.

Stockport Georgians made short work of a Cheadle Hulme side who have well and truly faded in August, bottom of the form guide for the month and

totally outplayed at Grove Park, all out 105 and going down to a third heavy loss in four. SG remain in pole promotion position but Mobberley's fantastic form has propelled them into serious contention, 202 pts out of a possible 225 attained in their last 9 matches. Their latest win came after a brilliant chase of 250 set by lowly Hale Barns, Joe Cooper's 105 the centrepiece. But another well paced chase with all six batters contributing solidly saw Mobb make use of the extra over they gained to record a fifth win on the trot. Romiley remain second after a good team performance in their 5 wkt win at Ashton OM, five batters making 30 or more. WK 18 - AUGUST 20

A day when arguably the shock result of the season in Div 3 really put the fox amongst the pigeons. North East Cheshire's five match winning streak came to an unexpected but decisive end at lowly Tattenhall, scrapping like mad for survival and boosting their chances with a splendid 44 run win. The man of the match was skipper Tom Hyslop, who rolled back the years with a magnificent 143 (132 bs, 20x4, 4x6) which dominated proceedings, and was some twothirds of the Tatt total of 217 (and in fact was three-quarters of his side's score when Hyslop was sixth out at 193). As if that wasn't enough, Hyslop then took the first NEC wicket on a day when the leaders just couldn't get going with the bat and were all out 173 - which, curiously, was the total they bowled Tatt out for in the reverse fixture in June. This news from the Flacca was a real boost for Maritime, for whom Vensakar Kanthiraj produced an unbelievable display, his 5-46 followed up by 105* at almost a run-a-ball as they knocked off 210 at Ashley to win by 5 wkts. Hawk Green were similarly lifted, clearly in no mood to trifle as Kingsley were blown away by 9 wkts, all out 102 before skipper Josh Hampson's 54* ensured a pointless day for the unfortunate visitors. Winnington Park's Sam Barnes carried his bat for 81* as his side made 222-7 against Barrow, who were soon in a real how-do-you-do at 12-3, only three

batters making double figures as Neil Langham's 6-33 saw them all out for 97. A vital win for WP in their quest to avoid the drop, as was Runcorn's nail-biting 7 run win over Oakmere. Will Magee made 80 and lan Cherry a lower order 42* which ushered Runcorn to 220. Although detail is sketchy, Oakmere got themselves into a terrific position thanks to 75 from Ciaran McDonnell and 87 from Zander Potgeiter but a dramatic collapse ensued which saw them all out for 213. Meanwhile Barnton's 8 wkt loss at Stockport formally confirmed their relegation, whilst also ensuring the Cale Green side kept the pressure on the top two after their 12th league win of 2022.

WK 19 - AUGUST 27

Stockport's perfect month put them right in the promotion hunt, their 5 wkt win over Oakmere a little on the scratchy side but still with plenty to spare, 50* from Naveed Gondal the highest score of the match. That result kept the pressure on leaders North East Cheshire, who beat out-ofform **Ashley** in a low scoring struggle at London Rd, making hard work of the 103 they needed after alarm bells were sounding at 15-3. Ashley's fourth defeat in a row saw them slip out of promotion contention and effectively leave it to Maritime and Hawk Green to jostle with the other two clubs highlighted. Maritime

made short work of Barrow who laboured for almost 42 overs but made just 60, Maritime mercifully putting the game out of its misery in just 10.1 overs. Hawk Green's Jordan Henderson took 6-51 as struggling Runcorn failed to build on James Wells' 65, going from 102-3 to 141 all out, and then were unable to finish the job after reducing HG to 70-5, Henderson to the rescue with the bat this time, making 20* as Pete Richards (40*) secured the points. Runcorn's trip home was made worse by learning that Tattenhall had pulled off a brilliant win at Kingsley. The two captains were the star players. Tatt's **Tom Hyslop** continuing his golden summer with a rasping 96 (85 bs) as Tatt totalled 198, Tom Eyley with 6-49. Hyslop was then in action with 3 wkts as Kingsley fell to 104-7, but Eyley marshalled his tail with 56, his stand with the last man worth 33 as Tatt nerves started to jangle before Eyley finally fell. All of which set up Runcorn's visit to Tattenhall on Sept 3rd very nicely, the same day that Stockport travel to Hawk Green in what will be two huge games in the Division. In the other match a fine all round display by Johnny Wales decisively settled the mid-Cheshire derby as Winnington Park won comfortably at Barnton.


BIRKENHEAD PK:
