FROM THE EDITOR






A very busy month of cricket is over, but we pitch into an even busier month, with several different competitions all in full swing. The 1st XI T20 knockout stages are underway after a round-robin stage which has attracted a fair bit of adverse comment and which to my mind could be dealt with a little more satisfactorily. No-one disputes the difficulties that evening T20 fixtures present, with players and officials often battling to grounds in heavy traffic, many also with work commitments that cannot be easily dispensed with, leading to the inevitable but unavoidable 'sameness' of many of the mini-group teams. There's also the need to ensure that out of all the entrants, there are 16 qualifiers for the knockout stages, which in turn has led to four mini-groups of just two teams, one match deciding who goes forward. I don't see why these groups can't be contested over two matches, with net run-rate (or some other agreed method) deciding who goes through in the event of each team winning a match. It would certainly seem to be a more satisfactory way of determining qualifi-

ers than just (potentially) winning two matches and being through to finals day. All of this, however (as with all else) lies in the gift of the competing clubs to propose such changes, so we will see if any proposals are forthcoming. Certainly this year's 1st XI T20 to date has produced some excellent games and brilliant performances, and, pleasingly, no matches conceded (although Didsbury & Marple agreed to cancel their final group game after neither could have progressed). Congratulations to the 3rd XI sides who have made it through to finals day, the 2nd XIs still in T20 contention, and all those involved in the longer Cup formats (be it in the National KO, the Cheshire Cup or Shield). There's some great cricket being played and I hope more clubs will do more to promote themselves, their teams and their achievements on their social media platforms. Many clubs have them but very few, it seems, update them regularly, which is a shame.

I also want to devote some space to the publication of a new book which I have been thoroughly enjoying and which I know many of my other colleagues would be glad to have a copy of too. Scott Oliver has put together a real labour of love about the regional game, entitled 'Sticky Dogs and Stardust', telling the tale of 22 professionals - stellar internationals, in



point of fact - who turned out for league clubs, most (but not all) based in Lancashire (where it was a League regulation that clubs had to have a professional player, to cultivate interest in the club and the game). You'll know all 22 players whose stories are told in the book, and while I can only imagine the amount of work it took to research and write, it is a wonderful piece of work, a real gem amongst too many flaccid cricket books, and I recommend it to you without hesitation.



TURNING BACK TIME...PART 3

So my scoring adventure was about to start a new chapter as I went solo, working on warm-up matches for the 2013 Champions Trophy as press box scorer.



I was at Edgbaston all by myself on Saturday 1st June, mercifully dry and fine, and getting into the media centre in plenty of time for the Sri Lanka v. India match. I used the stairs a long climb up five floors - and took some time to enjoy the wonderful view from without doubt the best media centre in English cricket (left). It's also the biggest, with space for some 130 journalists, but as the tournament had not exactly captured the cricketing public's imagination (it was an Ashes year, after all) there was a grand total of precisely 6 accredited journos in attendance. Spread right across the room. However, it was ideal for me, as a low-key dress rehearsal. My experience at Lords had shown me some things not im-

mediately obvious to the casual observer. I had noticed all the journos wearing ear-pieces tuned into either radio or TV commentary at Lords, and wondered why - but it's simply because all media centres are fronted by plate-glass and thus virtually no sound from outside is audible. Turn the volume right down on your TV next time you're watching a game and you will soon see how hard it is to follow a cricket match without sound, especially if you're scoring it. So an ear-piece is a pretty essential piece of kit if you are working in a cricket media centre. Except this match, being a warm-up, had zero radio commentary and although Sky were covering it, there was no feed of their commentary available. And because it was still a bit on the cool side, the powers-that-be had decided against opening

the media centre windows. This all dawned on me about the



time of the toss, which is also a scramble to ensure you have the right teams and the right shirt numbers! It was thus a rather frazzled press box scorer that nervously watched Kusal Perera and Tillikeratne Dilshan stroll out to face the Indian attack.

Initially, however, it was all quite straightforward. The two Sri Lankans walloped everything - the crack of the ball off Perera's bat was heard even through plate glass as the Indian seamers were taken to pieces. So Dhoni soon turned to spin, which is where my nightmare started. Ashwin and Jadeja are without doubt fine bowlers, but I hate them. This is because their run-ups, such as they are, are about three paces, and when your head is looking at sheets or a screen it is very easy to miss something without the sound of the action to nudge you into looking up. It turns out I missed a no-ball, which I only discovered a couple of overs after it had happened. Jadeja was bowling his over so quickly that I had no idea he'd had to bowl an extra delivery!

One of the journos told me I had announced a score different to the board. I discreetly panicked, my heart started racing, and I went to the CricInfo text commentary to see where I had gone wrong. I did this at the same moment as the wifi went down in the media centre! It took all my focus to keep as calm as I could, watch the game (which was still going on of course), record what I saw, and, when after an eternity (probably about two minutes) the wifi was restored, I scrolled through the text commentary (still watching the game), found the no-ball (phew) and then set about correcting the computer record, whilst keeping my sheets accurate so that I could then catch the computer record up. I did it, and got back to everything being right, but it was a horrible 20 minutes. And a salutary, very useful experience!

Next it was off to Cardiff - a place I had never been to before - for another warm up game and then, the real thing.

WK 7 - JUNE 3

Neston made surprisingly short work of an uncharacteristically flat Widnes side at Parkgate to stay top of the table, knocking off the paltry 104 they were set inside 18 overs as the visitors didn't get out of first gear. Luke Jones took 5-22 as Widnes lost 8-51 on a day to forget for them. Alderley Edge were another side who put in a surprisingly off-key display, their strong batting line up totally blunted by the Nantwich trio of Stockton, Foulkes and Spencer, who dismissed them for 100 (AE were 43-1 at one stage). Marcus Stables was glad to reverse a run of low scores for the Dabbers with 52 as they won by 6 wkts. At Filkins Lane, Didsbury skipper Nick Anderson was also shrugging off a bad run (his league inns to date: 0,1,0,28,0) with a magnificent 103 (92 bs) including 6 sixes, he and Sam Leech (66 off 59) adding 160 for the 5th wkt as Dids reached 322, their highest League total in several years. Several Chester BH batters all got starts, but 4 wkts apiece for the Green brothers saw them all out for 154. Hyde are delighted that George Balderson has been surprisingly overlooked for Lancs' T20 campaign, the all-rounder really in the mood for his home club, as Grappenhall discovered

to their cost, Balderson with 5-19 and then 73* as a formidablelooking Hyde made it three wins in a row. Predicted by some to struggle this year, Oxton's third win in four - a nail-biting 2 wkt victory at Townfield Lane against Toft - propelled them firmly into mid-table. The visitors made 224-8 (O'Shay Reddy 57) which looked way short as Luke Filer (71) and Henry Dobson (72) added a brilliant 152 for the 1st wkt in reply. However, that crumbled to 199-7 in the 51st (3 wkts fell in 4 balls at one stage) as the tension mounted, but with 5 needed off the last, Will Clayton found the boundary with two balls remaining to claim a vital win. Andrej Yaksender's 100 rescued Cheadle from 132-7, he and debutant Parth Gaikwad (39) adding 86 for the 8th as their side made 242. Despite being 62-0 after a rapid 48 off 24 from Todd Walker. Brooklands couldn't get other partnerships going, Gaikwad taking the last wkt as they were all out 185.

WK 8 - JUNE 10

A fascinating day of Premier Division cricket saw three sides tied at the top. **Hyde** convincingly beat **Didsbury** after a fine personal display from **Luke Young**, his 4 wkts

160, then leading off with 68 before Andrew Jackson hit successive sixes (6 in total in his 20-ball 47) to finish the game. A strong Neston side surprisingly came unstuck at **Grappenhall**, for whom Lancs 2s player Arav Shetty starred with 66 and then 5-19 as Neston slumped to 122 all out and a resounding 93 run defeat. Alderley Edge's Subhaan Mahmood made 100* as his side won by 5 wkts at luckless **Brooklands**, who couldn't capitalise on dismissing Kohler-Cadmore. **Perry** and **Wilkinson** with just 16 on the board. Mahmood and Charlie Barnard (63) added 138 to seal the win. Nantwich won a third game in a row with a demolition of an all at sea Toft. 58 all out as Phil Stockton and Jason Foulkes each took 5 wkts - the third time this season Toft take zero pts. Cheadle's Will Holmes (66 & 5-41) was their star turn in a splendid victory over Chester BH, who lost by 64 runs at Kingsway and slipped to their lowest position in many years. Oxton's surge continued, a fourth win in five coming after a thumping 117 run win over an outof-sorts Widnes who are now

The top vs. bottom fixture proved to be a one-sided affair as Bowdon swept to their victory target of 136 inside 22 overs at Congleton, whose sixth defeat in seven games left them at the foot of the table. Four wkts apiece for Joe Chapple and Matt Tully put the skids under the hosts, who were 85-8 until John Copeland injected some zest into proceedings. But it only delayed the inevitable, Chapple (49) the only man to be dismissed. skipper Jack Tipton 66* as the pair added 119 for the opening wkt. However, Congleton are only a point adrift of two other sides who have also lost six out of seven. Alvanley at least picked up 11 pts after a 2 wkt loss in an entertaining encounter with Lindow. Simon Gee finished 92* as Alv recovered from 14-2 to reach 240-6, adding 99 with Chris Charles who hit 68 from 39 bs. James Duffy's 70 anchored the Lindow response with other solid contributions getting them over the line - just - in the 49th. The other struggling side, Bramhall, had a similar chase at **Timperley**, where they needed 231 (having had the home side 164-7). However, a bright opening led to a familiar tail-off, Greg Dixon's defiant 79 (118 bs) the one

bright spot, the opener the last wkt to fall as his side were 148 all out. The surprise result of the day was at Victoria Rd where high -flying Sale lost to a Macclesfield team who'd only once previous. Fresh from his ton last week, Alex Thomson starred again, firstly with the ball, his 6-58 including the last wkt to fall, that of Pat Ashling for 98, stumped after a brilliant knock. Thomson then made 45, which along with 60 from Khalid Sawas saw Macc claim a fine 4 wkt win. Inconsistent Romiley came good, David Badrook's excellent 89* the bedrock of their whopping 267-6 against Urmston, who got nowhere close as Alex Hooton's 5-44 saw them all out 156. Simon Normanton's 94* was the glue holding Stockport Georgians together at Oulton Park, an 8th wkt stand of 86 with Jordan Richards lifting them from 127-7 to 214-8. The pair then bagged 7 wkts between them as the hosts were bowled out for 176.

WK 8 - JUNE 10

The top three all won and the bottom three all lost as both ends of the table maintained a familiar look. Bowdon made it 7 wins for the season after Jack Tipton (92) and Ross Zelem (73) added 149 for the 2nd in their 268-3 at Urmston, and even with Rob Lord not bowling. dismissed the hosts for 172, Luke McLaughlin's dashing 72 (50 bs) in stark contrast to the grim resistance of his colleagues. Sale made light work of an understrength Alvanley, winning by 9 wkts after Pat Ashling - dropped fourth ball - eased to an unbeaten 63. Timperley won a thriller off the last ball at Romiley, the hosts tailing off batting first after a strong start but still posting 260. Timpers' top five all contributed well and Jonathan Fowler's hard-hitting 50* led to last ball delight for his side. Lindow also chased well after Andrew Metcalf's 83* saw Oulton Park set them 222, James Duffy's 92* the anchor in a 6 wkt win, while at Flowery Field Ben Staniforth made 93 as **Georgians** overpowered lowly Congleton, winning by 100 runs after Simon Normanton's fine form continued with 7-41. Bramhall's fifth loss on the bounce came after Macclesfield got to 185 having been 128-8, Bram all out 125 after 5 more wkts for **Alex Thompson**.

Marple recorded a hard-fought 41 run win over **Haslington** at Bowden Lane to leapfrog the visitors and nick top spot. Asked to bat, the hosts worked hard against what many regard as the best attack in the division and reached 213-7, only one batter not making double figures. Despite 64 from Matt Kennerley-Ryan, Haslington only had one 50+ partnership and were all out 172. Marple's Mark Makin (44 & 3-47) and Has' Tom Gledhill 3-55 and 25) were both mentioned in dispatches. Mobberley went third but struggled again, a second loss of 2023 coming at Grove Park after choosing to bat and being knocked over for 143 by Cheadle Hulme, 60 from Matt Mountney their one consolation. 141* (143 bs, 3x6, 17x4), his stand of 150 with Max Fitzgerald (66) putting 262-4 on the board. PS (without Simon Melberzs) were all out in the 45th, a stand of 114 for the 3rd between Tyler Stagg (70) and Jamie Hodgson (63) their highlight. Haslington kept their good form going after a terrific chase at Bollington, who again posted a good total (241-8), but were undone by two Bens. Tomlinson (92) and Istead (66) adding 142 as Has squeaked home by 2 wkts in a gripping finish. 77 from Jason van der Meulen helped Davenham to 215 against NEC, despite 6-39 from Will Westerby. Jayden Camp (79*) ran out of partners after adding 76 with Will Ritchie (39). NEC all out 186. The quickest winners of the day were Mobberley who bowled out visitors Christleton for 100, knocking off the target inside 20 overs, while Cheadle Hulme were back to square one after going from 51-1 to 93 all out at Stockport. Naveed Gondal 7-38 before again coming to the rescue with the bat after his side were 47-6 in reply, he & Danny Barber (39) securing a 3 wkt win. A fifth win in six saw **Heaton Mersey** maintain top spot, the latest 25 pts courtesy of a 5 wkt win at Barrow, who slid from 117-2 to 134-7 after choosing to bat. 71 from David McClements and a last wkt stand of 37 lifted them to 203. But HM got off to a flying start, skipper Josh Ainscough (54) and Anre Schutte (81) adding 99 inside 16 overs which built the platform for 25 pts. Hawk Green's poor start is a distant memory now after their fourth straight win, this one a demolition of Winnington Park by an eye-watering 204 runs at Upper Hibbert Lane. Skipper Josh Hampson (102 off 115 bs) and Tearan Gleeson (94 off 78) led off with a rapid 158 opening stand, the pair hitting 21x4 and 7x6 between them. Sam Messih then weighed in with 73 off 50 as the boundaries continued to flow, HG calling a halt after 45 overs on 328-5. WP were not surprisingly out for the count and were dismissed inside 35 overs for 124, Elliot Young 5-42. An altogether closer match at Maritime where visitors **Ashley** won a thriller by just 3 runs, posting 182-9 after choosing to bat. time built a succession of partnerships but nothing substantive, Mushtag again at work with 3-49 as Maritime got to one boundary away from victory when the last man was lbw. Both sides remained close together in 3rd & 4th spot, with the altitude sickness pills on order at The Flacca after Tattenhall's win at Warrington lifted them to 5th. Freddie Cheshire's 5-28 saw the hosts bowled out for just 124, with Tatt's Brett **Taylor** then teeing off with 50 from 45, Archie Mobbs taking up the baton with 46* from 40 as the visitors won with bags of overs unused. Four wkts apiece for Nick Guest and Slade Mitrovic helped Oakmere defend 152 against **Upton**, who despite having 54 overs to chase kept losing wkts and were all out 141. Meanwhile 6-33 from Ben Stoddard ensured Northwich hopes of building on their win last week were dashed in short order as Kingsley skittled them for just 62, the match all done in 39 overs.
