Well didn't we need that sunshine! The difference it made to the cricket at the weekend was marked. especially compared to the same time last season. By the time of the equivalent edition last May, there had been 23 centuries across the four 1st XI Divisions - so far this season, before Saturday, there had been just four! Including precisely none in the Premier Division. On Saturday, however, we had five tons (two in the Prem) plus the first 300+ totals, a tie, one batter making almost 70% of his team's 158 total, other superb individual displays and battling team performances which is testimony to a number of factors - quality bowling being right up there of course! - but the conditions are also clearly playing their part, with sunshine and dryer weather clearly making a difference. In general, though, runs have generally been much harder to come by for teams, as well as for individuals, and we've had some notably low scores already across all four 1st XI Divisions, and with the forecast still unsettled, this may be the pattern of games for a while. One match has really stood out to me, which I want to examine in a little more detail. Now, I wouldn't normally use this column to highlight a specific match but Sale's visit to Urmston for their Div 1 game on May 6th is well worthy of comment. The details of a remarkable Sale run chase in what sounds like an amazing match are on the relevant page of the newsletter, but the salient point here regards the circumstances surrounding Sale's pursuit of 264 to win. After a partnership in excess of 150 (the second of the match) had taken Sale to 185-2 in the 32nd over, rain intervened shortly af-

terwards. The Sale match report states that "a tense wait saw ten overs wiped off the innings, leaving Sale 4.1 overs to get 34 runs". That's guite a delay to get that kind of reduction at such a crucial stage. But for Sale, to lose all those overs but see their target remain exactly the same is frankly ridiculous. That's no criticism of the match officials, who were simply applying the regulations as they are written. It's no criticism of either side. And it's no criticism of the league committees or officials, either. The current rules for rainaffected matches are as they are because enough clubs have decided that's how they want them to be - and I for one have never and still cannot understand why! DLS is made for just such situations so that a target can be fairly recalculated. and while I am not going to restate the strong arguments for its implementation in league cricket at this point, given the unsettled weather patterns, I doubt this is the last time I will be visiting the subject.

TURNING BACK TIME...PART 1

It was the season of 2013, ten years ago, I got a fortuitous break into the world of international scoring. Having recently been encouraged to take on the role of County Scorers Officer in Cheshire, I was informed of a role scoring with the media during the upcoming Champions Trophy that was available. My application was, to my great surprise, strong enough to get me the role and it started an unforgettable experience that was to last for another eight seasons in all. But to get me used to the role, the ECB invited me to come down to Lords to work the first two days of the Eng-NZ Test Match, which opened my eyes to the world of professional cricket in more ways than one!

MAY 16, 2013

It was the fulfilment of a personal dream to walk down the Wellington Rd from St.John's Wood tube station, the sun shining brightly as I made my way through the North Gate, proudly showing off my pass that got me easily admitted - a very nice feeling. I took the steps up to the media centre itself, took a deep breath, and went in. The view was simply stupendous....





I introduced myself to the regular press scorer, who I was to shadow for those two days, and learn what the role of press box scorer



entailed. I unpacked my stuff, first of all discovering just how tight for room things would be in the media centre - everyone has an allocated space and must stick to it. The press box scor-

er got two spaces which made us a bit special but the hardened journalists were far less impressed! But I was made to feel welcome and watched the busyness develop (scorers always arrive very early) as the toss time drew near. The photographers all had their briefing - they too have a specific spot on the ground, and the special ones get pitch access - and the steady stream of famous faces going upstairs to the commentary boxes was another

memorable thing. I did have the chance to pop up to see Malcolm Ashton in the TMS box, his the most coveted scoring position of all in the ground perhaps. The hallowed TMS window was open too!

The match itself was guite a staid affair until it suddenly burst into life on the fourth day when NZ collapsed. But the days I was there were pretty tough going for the paying public to be honest - there were weather delays and England took 112 overs making 232 -Brendon McCullum was NZ captain for this match, and I have wondered if days like that convinced him of the need to do things differently! I took in as much as I could, scoring the game, watching the journos at work and also watching my colleague work too, an-

nouncing various landmarks and odd stats of interest for journalists to tweet or report - and it would soon be my turn!

WK 3 - MAY 6

The remarkable result at Werneth Low was the big talking point of a rainaffected day. Hyde and Nantwich had met at the same ground on match day 3 last year and played out a high scoring draw, the Dabbers making 291-7 then. But twelve months on, they collapsed sensationally to 44 all out, losing 6 wkts in 3 overs without adding to their score at one stage, and 8 in 6 overs in all, Luke Young the destroyerin-chief with a pacy 6-18. Hyde had a mini-wobble of their own after the showers relented but made it consecutive 6 wkt wins. Chester BH also suffered the indignity of a double figure total, their 96 in front of their own supporters giving Alderley Edge a handsome 81 run triumph, Richard Wilkinson's 49 the highest innings of the match. Champions Didsbury added to the list of surprise results going down to a 2 wkt loss at a damp Wilmslow Rd as Widnes avenged the two defeats by the same margin they suffered at Dids' hands in 2022. Didsbury could only manage 139 (Aagib Uppal 6-56) and crucially gave 11 additional overs to the visitors, who had to survive a few scares going for the target. Some bold strokes from the lower order as the showers intensified saw them over the line for a famous win. That left Neston as the only team with three wins, a comfortable 7 wkt triumph at Parkgate over Oxton securing local bragging rights. Oxton were 65-2 but Ash Davis (4-32) sparked a clatter of wkts as the visitors were all out 130. David Hurst's 51* secured the pts with bags of overs in hand. The other two matches ended honours even. Cheadle's game with Toft at Kingsway abandoned 17 overs into the visitors' reply to Cheadle's 211, which from 100-7 was good going. Andrej Yaksender was left unbeaten on 99 after last man Mark Hampson was run out. Toft were 66-3 when rain ended play. Brooklands produced a robust batting display to make 248 against Grappenhall (Jack Bagshaw 64*), Grappers happy to lose 6 overs from their allocation as they survived on 180-9.

WK 4 - MAY 14

Neston continued their wonderful start with a fourth straight win, this one a superb 95 run triumph at Nantwich. Put into bat, Neston were disappointed to be all out 209 after being 170-3 (Matt Strong 65, Ali Chugtai 56), but a rampaging Ash Davis wreaked havoc, the Dabbers shattered at 31-7 and finally all out for 114, Davis an unplayable 7-20.

Alderley Edge won a third game in a row, a convincing 109 run win over a Hyde side who were back to earth with a bump after last week's performance. Ben Kohler-Cadmore's brilliant 126 (10x6, 9x4) was by some way the innings of the match, helping AE to their highest total of the season so far. Richard Wilkinson's 5-39 included the key wkt of Andrew Jackson, with only Luke Young (52) making a score of substance. Didsbury's Rob Sehmi (114) and Steve Green (49) added 133 for the 6th wkt to help their side to 261 at Grappenhall, Green then returning a fabulous 8-71 to secure a 56 run win. Widnes became the first side to pass 300 in the Prem, their 301-7 v Cheadle mainly through Rohan Luthra hitting 7x6 on his way to 89 and Aaqib Uppal two in his 54, Uppal then taking 4-53 in a 94 run win, Cheadle battling hard (again) but all out in the 52nd. Oxton claimed a big 25 pts - just - by defending 112 against Brooklands, who were 65-9. Joe Gill and Rob Leach then fought tenaciously but just fell short, Brooklands 103 all out. Chester BH dominated at Toft but the hosts' last pair held out for some ten overs to secure a draw.

WK 3 - MAY 6

The game of the day - already commented upon in the editorial - was at Moorside Rd where Sale maintained their perfect start after a fantastic run chase. Hosts Urmston, put in, lost a wkt fourth ball and were soon 26-2. but a superlative stand of 192 between Ryan O'Brien (105) and Liam Marshall (126*) lifted them to 263-3, Marshall hammering 27 off the final over of the inns. Marshall then dismissed the prolific Pat Ashling cheaply, but, undeterred, James Dodds (103*) and Tyrone Lawrence (84) added a run-a-ball 161 for the 2nd, the thrilling batting continuing. Dan Newton came in after Lawrence, hitting 22 off his first 9 bs, but rain arrived and caused a lengthy delay. However, the umpires got the players back on for 4 overs of play, and with 34 still needed, Newton picked up where he left off, his 55* off 29 doing the business as Dodds brought the scores level with a boundary that also gave him his hundred. The other side with three from three are **Bowdon**. whose 46 run win over Timperley would have been significantly greater but for a last wkt stand of 89 between Tom Matthews (46*) and Chris Page (45), who came together with Timpers 51-9 after Rob Lord (6-40) and Joe

Chapple (4-37) had caused havoc. Bowdon had been in strife of their own at 107-7 (Nathan Brown 5-31) but Matt Tully's pugnacious 52* from no.8 saved Bowdonian bacon. Teix Bolingbroke hit a four to reach an unbeaten 50 off 111 balls and win the match as Oulton Park ground out a 6 wkt win at Alvanley. while Macclesfield - despite a rain interruption - got an important first 25 pts of 2023 with a comfortable 8 wkt win over Congleton. The rain which finally halted play at Church Lane was welcomed more by hosts Bramhall than by Lindow, who still had 34 overs to make the 124 they needed to win but ended on 102-5, and it was a similar story at Birchvale Drive where Romiley were all out 122 after being 94-1 playing Stockport Georgians (Simon Normanton 5-24). SG were 99-5 off 21 when no further play was possible.

WK 4 - MAY 13

Sale's superb 2023 continued with a straightforward 5 wkt win over Bramhall (Tyrone Lawrence 68*) but Bowdon's perfect start surprisingly stalled at Victoria Rd. Ben Gibson made a brilliant 101 out of Macc's 200, and the Macc bowling then stifled a strong batting line-up, Bowdon grateful to Ross Zelem

(58* from 119 bs) helping the last man hold out for 5 overs to draw. A remarkable 9 wkt win for Romiley against a Lindow side containing both James Duffy and Matt Parkinson was the standout result of the day, Brad Snape and Alex Hooton (6-46) reducing Lindow to 12-6 and then 29-7 before Finn Gavaghan (95 off 86 bs) and Alex Matthews (42) added 126 for the 8th wkt. Chasing 166, Isaac Willett made 112* off 111 bs as Romiley won inside 32 overs, the only wkt falling to a run out. Another five wkt haul for Liam Marshall helped Urmston come out impressive 78 run winners at Oulton Park, while Congleton ended a run of terrible results with a 93 run win over an Alvanley side containing Sophie Ecclestone. the world no.1 taking 2-55 in Congleton's modest-looking 159-8. But she was upstaged by Muhammad Kashif's amazing spell of 10-6-8-6 as Alvanley fell in a calamitous heap from 46-0 to 66 all out. Timperley recovered from 77-6 to make 234 (Caedence Kupper 72 off 57) against Stockport Georgians who were left clinging on at 158-9 as their last pair fought hard.

Three winners on a rainy afternoon in Div 2, Marple perhaps the most relieved after their previous matches were both abandoned. Rain did affect their match with NE Cheshire at Poynton but Joe Cash's splendid 8-24 set them 149 to win. Grant Hodnett's 63 (6x6, 3x4) was the mainstay of a ticklish chase. Marple home by 3 wkts. Mobberley were also indebted to a veteran bowler as Abdul Ageel's 7-20 saw Davenham routed for just 67, the last 7 Dav wkts going down for just 13 runs. Grove Park with visitors Christleton a far-from-secure 108-5 looking at 227 to win. Rhys Collister made a lively 72* and Hashir Khan 67 in CH's inns. But it was Haslington who were left truly ruing their fortune with the rain as Hale Barns were left clinging on at 114-8 off 39 at a sodden Brooks Drive, still 101 short of a win. Jordan Sealey earlier made 81 in the Haslington inns which was given some late thrust to reach 214-9.

WK 4 - MAY 13

Mobberley found themselves in nosebleed territory, top of the shop after thrashing Ashton OM by 199 runs at a verdant Church Lane. Ibrar Latif's 83 set the stage for a late assault by (you guessed)...Abdul Ageel, whose 29-ball 63* was the main reason 95 runs came off the last 10. Mobb closing on 300-7. Ageel was then in the thick of it with the ball, a stunning 7-45 seeing AOM off for just 101. The result of the day was at Bowden Lane where Marple (144) tied with Cheadle Hulme, the hosts toasting Jack Grundy after his final over of the match, from which CH needed

just 5 to win with 3 wkts in hand. After taking four off the first three deliveries to level scores. Grundy had Tom Balderson Ibw, saw Scott Howarth run out with a direct hit off ball five, and then bowled former Marple favourite Andy Wylie with the final ball in a grandstand finish, with both sides taking 16 pts. Hale Barns won a low-scoring affair at Port Sunlight by 18 runs, PS folding from 128-6 to 134 all out. Skipper Ben Istead took 4-5 as Haslington bundled out N.E. Cheshire for just 86, but 3 wkts apiece for Will Westerby and Jayden Camp had Haslington sweating as they inched to a 3 wkt win. Five Stockport players bagged ducks at Davenham, Naveed Gondal's 63 just over half their final total of 122, evergreen Robin Taylor returning 5-65. Mike Rudd's 50* secured an 8 wkt win. Way out west, Bollington got a heartening first 25 pts since their relegation with a well-earned 5 wkt win at Christleton, Theo Johnson's 48* off 54 in sparkling contrast to all the batting that went before as Bolly's long journey - on a day when the M56 was closed - was rewarded in the best way possible.

Division 3 was the only one to record six definitive results on a dank day. with four sides experiencing the ecstacy or agony of a 1 wkt win. Tattenhall came out on top by this narrow margin in the derby at **Barrow**, **Dave** McClements (62) scoring almost half the hosts' total of 126. He was finally dismissed by Freddie Cheshire, who went onto make a patient 39* (89 bs) to steer Tatt over the line in dramatic circumstances. It was every bit as tense on the Wirral as Maritime somehow clung on at 62-8 to make the 106 they needed to beat Northwich, thanks largely to a tenacious 35* (70 bs) from skipper Thisal Jayawardene. The Vics – who had earlier fallen in a terrible heap from 90-3 to total just 105 - saw a golden opportunity for 25 pts slip away. The other winners were all much more comfortable, Heaton Mersey's 153 run demolition of Winnington Park the standout in that regard. Luke Marshall's 5-24 did the damage for HM after their first three batters all made 50 or more in a final total of 235-5. James Lewis made the top score of 51 in Warrington's 223-9 at Oakmere, who fought hard but fell to a disappointing 162 after being 151-5 at one stage, while Hawk

Green's spluttering start continued at Upper Hibbert Lane. Ben Stoddard led the way with 60 for visitors Kingsley, whose innings was halted in the 40th over by rain with them 187-9. HG were left with 35 overs to chase, 49 apiece from Josh Hampson & Elliot Young making a brave tilt at the target, but a dramatic collapse saw the hosts lose 6-6, all out 140. Tom Waring clean bowled the last man in the penultimate over to claim 5-36 and 25 pts. In the other game a fine 2nd wkt stand of 142 between Daniel Seaton (73*) and Tom Marsland (83) led Upton to a handsome 8 wkt win at Ashley, Ammad Mushtag having earlier made 73 for his side as they were all out 175. membered for the extraordinary performance of Barrow opener Ryan McLean. He made 112 (122 bs, 8x6, 6x4) out of 142 until he was eighth out. Barrow adding 16 more as Upton were set 159. Luca Di Stefano's unbeaten 45 (105 bs) anchored the successful chase. Ashley made short work of things at Winnington Park, bowling the hosts out for 91 with Jahangir Mushtag taking 3-5 before making an unbeaten 29 to assist Syed Azam Shah (49*) claim the 25 pts while WP have collected iust 6 pts from their last three matches. Tattenhall sprung the surprise of the day by bowling out in-form Maritime for just 80 to bag a 91 run win, the Tattenhall veterans Tom Hyslop and Alan Brock taking 7-52 from 26 overs between them. George Waring made 76 for Kingsley at The Croft who looked well set for a big score in their local derby with Oakmere, but Nick Guest's 5-30 induced a collapse to 129 all out. the visitors clearing off back up the A49 with 25 pts after Slade Mitrovic's 51 helped them scramble to a 3 wkt win. Despite only totalling 121, Hawk Green finally got a win after Northwich seemed not to fancy the chase at Moss Farm, all out for 85 in the 41st.

PREMIER DIVISION

Wk 3 (May 6) Chester BH finally got 25 pts under their belts, a thrilling 11 run win over Bowdon due in large part to evergreens Dan Riley and Robin Fisher, the pair firstly adding what turned out to be a crucial 14 for the last CBH wkt before sparking a collapse amongst a Bowdon line up who were 114-6 to 117 all out, Riley 6-31, Fisher 4-16. Neston mirrored their 1st XI with a big win over Oxton, the 131 run margin deceptively close as the lost Oxton pair were one over away from safety. A makeshift Didsbury 2s drew at Lindow in a match truncated by rain, Syed Bilal Hussain Shah's 109* out of Lindow's 190-8 the headline. At Dane Rd, Sale did well to make 150 after being 88-7 against Brooklands but the visitors had few problems recording an 8 wkt win. Ed Stubbs made a brilliant 128 in Toft's 255-7 against Cheadle who were some way short at 158-7, rain cutting their reply short. Hyde's long trip to Nant-wich was frustratingly washed out after just 28 overs, Hyde 81-5.

Wk 4 (May 13) A comfortable 9 wkt win for **Toft** over an out-of-sorts **Chester BH** was the big story of the day, **Ed Stubbs** (61*) and **George Muirhead** (41*) adding an unbroken 90 as CBH's 129 proved some way short. **Neston's** 209-8 was the highest total of the day, **Tom Jones** their sex bomb with 33* off 17 bs at no.9 and then 3-27,

visitors Nantwich all out 131. Sale could make a few bob marketing the video of their 118-9 in 50 overs at Didsbury as a cure for insomnia, the leaders going on to win by 6 wkts. Like their 1st XI counterparts, Brooklands and Oxton were involved in a low scoring thriller, Brooklands' 145 looking inadequate when Oxton were 93-4, but Caleb Jones took two quick wkts on his way to 4-31, Brooklands winning by 26 runs in the end. Lindow bowled Cheadle out for 92 en-route to a 6 wkt win while the Hyde v Bowdon scorecard is still incomplete.

2ND XI DIV 1

Timperley are the early pacesetters, winning all four of their matches, including a 4 wkt win over Stockport Georgians on May 13th which ended SG's winning streak. Grappenhall won out by 1 wkt in a tense struggle with visitors Heaton Mersey on May 6, but then fell in a heap a week later, 77 all out at Bramhall, who won an untidy scrap by 3 wkts. Romiley fared even worse, 56 all out not surprisingly child's play for Widnes to knock off, in contrast to the previous week when Widnes made 274-5 in a high scoring draw with **Bramhall** (245-4). A.Edge crashed to 52 all out against Macclesfield, while Oulton Park have made a poor start after their relegation, losing all four fixtures, the latest setback for them a 5 wkt loss at Heaton Mersey. Despite James Crisall's 75, Marple collapsed from 170-4 to 184 all out at Alvanley, the hosts grinding out a 6 wkt win in the 49th over.

2ND XI DIV 2

Cheadle Hulme and Urmston made perfect starts to their seasons. Both had big wins on May 6th, CH a whopping 145 runs too good for Warrington, who got another pasting at Urmston a week later, a ghastly seizure seeing them 61 all out after being 50-2, and leaving them bottom of the early table, to no great surprise. Neston's buttock-clenching 112-8 in 50 overs at CH on Sat 13th was not surprisingly insufficient to win. Ashton OM's 108 represented a decent effort after being 8-5 at Port Sunlight on May 6th, PS themselves slipping to 49-6 but hanging on to win a nailbiter in the last over by 1 wkt. **PS** won again on Sat after bowling out Hale Barns for 70 after Gareth Brooks, having earlier made 42* in his side's 131, took 8-26. Bollington have made a heartening start to life in Div 3 with three straight wins, their 66 run win over **Runcorn** featuring a 149 run stand for the 4th wkt from Peter Henshall (97) and Ross Duncan (92*). However, Bolly came unstuck against Christleton on Sat, who won by 4 wkts and went top as a result. On May 6th Harry Hatchell made 102 for Ashley in their 150 run over a Mobberley side skittled for 67 and currently with just 6 pts after a Covid-induced 'loss' on Sat. Also struggling, **Upton** went from 47-2 to 54 all out at Congleton on May 6th, who only need 6 overs to secure a 10 wkt win, Cong winning again on May 13th as Upton lost again to CBH 3s.



ECB NATIONAL CLUB CHAMPIONSHIP K.O.

10 sides from the CCCL, along with Westminster Park of the Cheshire Cricket League, entered the 2023 National Club Challenge. Sadly, on May 7th, Hyde and Widnes, coming off the back of excellent league wins the day before, lost their matches, while Chester BH came off a chastening league loss to record an impressive victory! On May 14th, Nantwich, who agonisingly lost out by 1 run in the final at Lords last year, went through after their opponents conceded, and four other CCCL sides secured passage through to the next round.

Preliminary Round matches, May 7:

Grp 6: *Hyde (219) lost to Orrell Red Triangle (236-7).* **Andrew Jackson** hit 70 out of a 3rd wkt stand of 88 with **Rohit Acharya**, who made a fine 73, but a strong Hyde team fell just 17 runs short in an entertaining match.

Grp 6: *Widnes (158) lost to Leigh (258-7) by 100 runs. A* weakened Widnes side were further depleted with **Qamar Hafiz** unable to bowl, Leigh's **Matthew McKiernan** making 102 off 79 as the visitors posted a daunting total. When **Rohan Luthra's** defiant knock of 58 was over, Widnes were 129-5 and had too much to do.

Grp 7: Chester BH (207) beat Halesowen (87) by 120 runs. 73 from keeper Angus Kilby enabled a belowstrength CBH to post a reasonable total but a terrific performance from the bowlers blew the visitors away.

First Round matches, May 14:

Gp 5: St Annes (178-9) beat Neston (176-9) by 1 wkt. Despite the in-form Matt Strong falling first ball, David Hurst's superb 90 held the Neston inns together, and when St Anne's were 70-7 Neston were odds-on to progress. But no.9 Mitch Bolus had other ideas, 4 sixes and 5 fours in his unbeaten 64 galvanising the tail as St.Annes snatched a dramatic victory off the last ball.

Gp 7: *Didsbury* (256) *beat Longton* (77) *by* 179 *runs.* Hosts Didsbury had too much for Longton, powering off to a flying start, keeping the run-rate above 6 throughout their innings and reducing the visitors, all at sea, to 32-5 in their powerplay, finally all out inside 21 overs.

Oulton Park (185) beat **Moddershall & Oulton** (164) by 21 runs. A gripping encounter looked over as M&O tumbled to 104-8 in the 27th, but a stand of 60 in 12 overs for the 9th made things very tense. Skipper **Martyn East** (who earlier made 64) claimed the two remaining wickets in the 39th over.

Shrewsbury (184) beat Chester BH (67) by 117 runs. Chester were no match for their opponents, both openers out for ducks (including Warren Goodwin, who made a double-ton in their opening National KO game last season) as CBH were 11-4 after 5 overs. Only skipper Rick Moore (34*) made double figures on a disappointing day for the Prem side.

Gp 8: Alderley Edge (200-8) beat Knowle & Dorridge (199-8) by 2 wkts. Alderley Edge were in some strife at 135-6 but an unbeaten 71 from Subhaan Mahmood kept things under control.

Oxton (180-5) beat **Hem Heath** (179-7) by 5 wkts. A match where all batsmen struggled for fluency was decided by **Henry Dobson's** 89* which guided Oxton to the win with two balls remaining.

Porthill Park (46-0) beat **Westminster Park** (45) by 10 wkts. The glorious optimism of CCL outfit Westminster Park entering the National KO was ruthlessly crushed in a hopeless mis-match against one of the strongest sides in regional league cricket, the whole match done inside 20 overs.

DEFIANT CHESHIRE BOW OUT

Wretched luck with the weather meant that **Cheshire** were unable to progress in the NCCA T20 even before their trip to Netherfield for their double header with **Cumbria** on May 7th, but to the great credit of their side, they won two close-run matches with the hosts to finish as runners-up in the group, just appoint behind winners Staffordshire. Opting to bat first in Match 1, Cheshire's 135-8 looked light, especially when Cumbria were 93-1 in the 13th. However, an unfortunate injury to non-striker **Gary Pratt**, struck on the arm by a shot from his partner **Sam Dutton**, saw him retire not out, and Cheshire fought back brilliantly to leave Cumbria requiring 16 off the last over - they could only get 11 and Cheshire were home by 4 runs. **Match 2** was every bit as close, Cumbria choosing to bat first, Nantwich's **Marcus Stables** making 41* in their 144-4. **Sam Perry** (right) anchored the chase which



was turbo-charged by skipper **Nick Anderson** whacking six maximums in his 32-ball 50. Cheshire needed 16 from the last and Perry hammered a six first ball and a four off the last to seal a breath-taking 6 wkt win, rounding off a successful competition for the Alderley Edge skipper who hit 72 off 46 in the game against Staffordshire. Cheshire's attention now turns to the 50 over format, with a trip to East Anglia to take on Norfolk (May 28) and Suffolk (May 29) their next games, followed by two more home fixtures in June (details below).
