3rd XI T20 group stage concludes



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It's good to be back, writing about and covering the game we all love. We were extraordinarily blessed last year with the amount of fine dry weather which saw hardly any disruption to fixtures - but this year, it's been a different story, with rainfall already a factor, and to have only two 1st XI centurions across 36 matches already played also hints at the type of conditions cricket is being

played in. The county side have also suffered, with five of their opening six T20 matches washed out, and qualification to finals day now sadly beyond them. The one major change to County League cricket is the decision to make all Sunday cricket a win/lose format, the Sunday Prem being reduced to 80 overs and losing the draw element. Quite how this was passed by a 10-4 margin when there are only 10 teams in the division is another matter! But we will see what impact this has and how players looking to play for their 2nd and 1st XIs are impacted by the difference. We also have a raft of amended laws to adapt to, most of which I think aren't really necessary - it's the fourth laws revision since 2017 and the mass of pulped law books, outdated editions of Tom Smith's umpiring and scoring handbook (which has become ever more unreadable and



frankly off-putting) as well as training materials is really quite shocking. Hopefully the MCC will now leave well alone. But I want to finish this first 2023 piece on a positive note, and, as was pointed out to me recently, the opening rounds of County Championship fixtures have seen Jack White (ex-Timperley) and Ben Gibbon (ex-OP) open the bowling for their respective counties, as well as Cheshire's Michael Finan taking the new ball for Leicestershire. Along with George Bell being the latest CCCL-bred player impressing for Lancs, and Sophie Ecclestone continuing her reign as the world's no.1 bowler in IT20 and ODI, Cheshire cricket can continue to point to its impact on the wider game, which we can all take pride in. Let's hope for a bumper May full of good weather and great cricket!

10 YEARS AGO

A virtually unspoilt first couple of weeks of the 2013 campaign saw eventual champions Chester BH draw their opening two matches despite racking up sizeable totals in both indeed, Hyde finished just 10 runs shy of overtaking CBH's 292-8 in wk 2. CBH's Warren Goodwin hit 92 and 116 in what was to be a prolific season for him, with 1468 runs coming in all competitions. Eventual runners-up Neston started strongly with two wins over Marple and Oxton, as did Toft, who followed up a thrilling 1 wkt opening day win at Bowdon with a 5 wkt win over Marple, inspired by Rob Jones' 6-45. The Bowden Lane outfit were to endure a tough season, losing five of their last six games (the other abandoned), but they somehow survived, their 33 run win over Didsbury on July 27 proving crucial as Didsbury and Macclesfield went down. In Division 1, Heaton Mersey's overseas player Aaron Ayre was to embark



on a spectacular personal 2013 with 15 x 6 and 11 x 4 in his 150 as they thrashed **Bredbury SM** by 108 runs, but this proved to be the falsest of all dawns as Mersey were to finish bottom of the division, with BSM also going down – both 1st XIs hitting a downward spiral that was to take some years to stabilise. **Bramhall** topped the division with **Urmston** runners-up, despite losing their first two matches. **Timperley** won Div 2 by a mile, starting off with two resounding wins, by 96 runs over **Congleton** and then a 212 run hammering of **Irby**, who were bowled out for 36. **Davenham** finished second while **Stockport Georgians** and **Bollington** made up the bottom two. One other notable feature of the opening fortnight ten years ago were the fortunes of **Oxton** bowler **Andy Birley**. In 2012, after two games he had figures of 38.2 - 12 - 61 - 14; two games into 2013 and his combined figures read 19 - 1 - 118 - 0. Well, we all know what a great leveller cricket can be!

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NEW LAWS CODE FOR 2023



The MCC have produced yet another revamp of the laws of cricket, this being the fourth since 2017! Here's a brief guide to the

significant additions and alterations.

NEW BATTER TO TAKE STRIKE WHEN A CATCH HAS BEEN COMPLETED

Law 18:11 is the most well-publicised of the new laws, adapting an idea brought in via The Hundred, so that when a catch is taken, the new batter will be on strike regardless of whether or not the batters have crossed (unless the dismissal occurred from the last ball of an over).

SHORT RUNS AFTER OVERTHROWS WILL NOT COUNT

Law 18:4:2 is quite a technical alteration (in my view, somewhat un-necessary) but it is nonetheless now enshrined in law. As an example: striker hits ball into outfield, batters run and cross, fielder picks up ball and shies at the stumps, misses, and the ball speeds off towards the boundary. Batters stop running as the boundary is inevitable and indeed, the ball crosses the boundary. Under the previous code this would be five runs (batters have crossed before the ball was thrown) but now, unless the batters actually complete the run, they will only get the four runs for the overthrow. I reckon this will catch out quite a few batters (and umpires) during the season!

NO SALIVA TO BE APPLIED TO THE BALL

Law 41:3 covers changing the condition of the match ball, and MCC have instructed that applying saliva to the ball is to be dealt with under this law – in other words, should it occur, an immediate award of penalty runs takes place and the batters can choose to replace the ball. Players can still apply sweat, and rub the ball on their clothing to shine it – just don't use saliva.

There is also a sensible amendment to Law 19, to allow umpires to signal a boundary where an unforeseen obstruction or occurrence prevents the ball from actually crossing the rope or line. For example, when an over-enthusiastic spectator steps onto the ground to throw the ball back before it has crossed the boundary.



A BATTER'S HELMET FALLING ONTO THEIR WICKET IS NOT OUT

An interesting alteration to Law 29:2 (which covers the wicket being broken fairly) states that the striker's protective helmet (or attached bits, like a neck protector) is exempt from being penalised (by dismissal) should it break the wicket if it falls from the head. From now on, in such instances, it's not out.

TIMED OUT LAW ALTERED

Timed Out (Law 40) is a perfectly valid form of dismissal more relevant in T20 where there is a 90 second allowance The law has now been altered to say that the new batter must be 'ready to receive the ball' within 3 mins (or, presumably, 90 seconds in T20), or that the batter currently in must also be ready to receive the ball within those time frames. The only exception is if 'time' has been called (e.g. drinks are being taken at the fall of a wicket).

EXCESSIVE MOVEMENT BY KEEPER OR FIELDER PRIOR TO A SHOT BEING PLAYED

Law 27:4:2 (the wicketkeeper) and 28:6 (the fielder) both now bring an *immediate* award of penalty runs into play should either a keeper or fielder alter their position significantly before the batter has played their shot. A keeper (and fielders) are still permitted to move in anticipation of a shot that the batter looks likely to try and play – e.g. a reverse sweep. The change in the law is to penalise any fielders moving excessively (e.g. from deep square leg to fine leg, say) while the bowler is running in, or a keeper moving too far (e.g. standing back but then coming much closer to the stumps as the bowler runs in). Previously such an occurrence would be called 'dead ball' but the powers-that-be have decided to take this further.

BATTER MUST PLAY THE BALL STANDING ON THE PITCH

You will be familiar with the scenario of a bowler getting their release all wrong and the ball ballooning out towards gully or point. Although it generally provokes laughter and apologies, there has been controversy in such instances of the batter racing towards the ball to try and whack it to the boundary, bowler and/or fielders trying to retrieve it before it's hit - and whether the umpire should allow it, or call dead ball, or no ball (or wide). Well, from now on Law 21:8 and 25:8 (which slightly contradict each other) deal with this – the batter must have some part of their person or bat either grounded on (or raised directly above) the pitch to play any shot. If such a ball is delivered the umpire will call no ball immediately followed by dead ball.

CHESHIRE CUP & CHESHIRE SHIELD 2023

HOLDERS: NANTWICH (CHESHIRE CUP) & ROMILEY (CHESHIRE SHIELD)

The 2023 competitions get underway on **May 21** with 15 fixtures spread across the county. Nantwich receive a bye into round two after their win last year at Birkenhead Park, who face a long trip across to Bowdon in their first tie this season. The Cheshire Cup will be a red ball, white clothing competition although changes to this are being considered for 2024 and beyond, with competition regulations unchanged from 2022. The first round draw is as follows:



CCCL PREMIER DIVISION



WK 1: APRIL 22

A mercifully dry first day of 2023 saw six teams victorious in the top flight. with champions **Didsbury** involved in the game of the day as they ran out 22 run winners over Alderley Edge at Wilmslow Rd. The result looked improbable after the hosts slid to 135-8 in the 40th over, but a magnificent unbroken stand of 99 for the 9th between Sam Leech (78*) and Liam Booth (50*) powered Dids to the unthinkable heights of 234-9. AE slid to 39-3 but Archie Vaughan - dropped fourth ball - led the recovery, first with Ed Foster and then Richard Wilkinson. The AE veteran looked in commanding form, hitting 42 off 19 balls at one stage as AE reached 158-4 in the 42nd, by that time the favourites. But when Vaughan (69) was stumped, a clatter of wkts courtesy of Steve Green (7-66) saw Wilkinson run out of partners, ninth out for a superb 89 as Didsbury claimed the last wkt in the penultimate over. Just down the road. Nantwich put in a workmanlike display to record a 75 run at promoted Cheadle, Luke Robinson's 67 the mainstay of their 220. Debutant Jason Foulkes then retuned 7-36 as Cheadle, fighting hard from 54-7, were bowled out for 145. Neston recorded a hugely encouraging 77 run win against a strong Hyde outfit at Werneth Low. 56 from Matt Strong and 68 from Luke Jones (at no.7) saw

the visitors go from 145-5 to 256-9, aided by 34 extras. Only four Hyde batsmen made it into double figures, and despite a typically pugnacious 61 from Andrew Jackson (including 8 sixes!) Hyde were bowled out inside 36 overs for 179. Elsewhere, Matt Burns (60) and Rohan Luthra (73*) added 101 to help Widnes to a 7 wkt win at Brooklands, while a low-key affair at Filkins Lane saw Chester BH complete an untidy 5 wkt win over Oxton after dismissing the visitors for 125. Grappenhall's return to the Prem was a difficult one, four early Tom Forster wkts leaving them 43-4, and despite a painstaking 40 from Ben Bodha. Toft were set just 123 to win, which they reached in the 32nd over. Grappers will be encouraged to have taken 6 wkts at least but the 25 early pts for a Toft side that struggled last season was a big boost.

WK 2: APRIL 29

However, **Toft** then suffered the worst possible start to their home fixtures, losing 9-15 in a horror show with the bat as **Didsbury** skittled them for just 49, **Liam Booth's** 6-12 setting up a 10 wkt win comfortably completed inside 32 overs of playing time. **Nantwich** also made it two from two with a surprisingly straightforward 6 wkt win over **Chester BH**, extras top scoring

in their pusillanimous 116 at
Whitehouse Lane. Although a
couple of early wkts boosted the
visitors, Luke Robinson's 65*
saw the Dabbers home inside
26 overs. Neston were the other
side to make it a 50 pt April af-
ter knocking off a challenging
265 set by visitors Brooklands ,
a 48-ball 77 from Kevin Carroll
their mainstay. In reply, captain
Dane Williams made 81 and
Matthew Strong 70*, his good
early season form continuing as
Neston completed an impres-
sive chase with an over to spare-
won with an over to spare. Henry
Dobson's 72 for Oxton's was
their only crumb of comfort in a
total of 128 against Hyde , who
had few problems notching their
first win of the campaign, leav-
ing Oxton - who won their first
four games of 2022 - with only 3
pts from their opening matches.
Cheadle have also found it hard
going back in the top flight, an-
other battling display with the
bat to reach 188-7 (Dan Wil-
liams 66*) not enough against
Alderley Edge who had to work,
but won by 4 wkts, while Grap-
penhall's Albert Pennington
made 60* and Arav Shetty 56
(after taking 3-31) as their side
recorded a morale boosting first
win away at Widnes.

CCCL DIVISION ONE



WK 1: APRIL 22

Two emphatic results in Div 1 as six sides all kicked their campaigns off with wins. Sale were the headline act, a 158 run demolition of new boys Stockport Georgians at Dane Rd really catching the eye. Player of the season 2022 Pat Ashling (97) carried on where he left off last year, before Dan Newton (84 off 66 and then 5-18) put in a stellar performance as Georgians were dismissed for just 96. Tyrone Lawrence also chipped in with 38 in his side's 254-6, and later 3-22. Bowdon set about an immediate return to the top flight with an equally dominant bowling display at Church Lane, dismissing **Bramhall** for just 74 after the hosts had reached 51-3 in pursuit of 173. Ross Zelem earlier made 76 for a Bowdon side that looks a good bet to be involved at the top end throughout the season. Two other sides harbouring Premier ambitions, Timperley and Oulton Park, played out a thriller at Stockport Rd. Put in, OP made 186-9 in their allocation before reducing a healthy-looking Timpers line-up to 74-6 in the 26th. However, a brilliant revival led by Caedence Kupper (71*) saw him add 39 with Jonathan Fowler and then an unbroken 74 for the 9th with Tom Matthews (26), the pair scrambling 2 byes off the fourth ball of the last over to claim a famous win. There was another remarkable recovery at Moorside Rd as

Lindow were powered to a 5 wkt win over **Urmston** courtesy of a fabulous 120* from Rob Herriott, the only centurion in any 1st XI fixture on day 1. Along with Max Law (54*), Herriott's 101-ball gem saw the pair add 172*, Lindow racing to their 186 target after being 17-5, a stunned Urmston side unable to press home their seemingly strong advantage. Romiley had a much more straightforward win over **Congleton** at Birchvale Drive, James Badrock's 5-22 seeing the mercurial visitors dismissed for 134. An impressive 82* on debut from Isaac Willett saw an 8 wkt win secured with plenty to spare. Alvanley were the other winners, their 170 at Victoria Rd proving to be 36 too many for Macclesfield.

WK 2: APRIL 29

A thrilling match at South Downs Rd saw Bowdon make it two from two with a last-gasp one wkt win over Romiley. The visitors' 151 looked no great shakes but another 5-for from James Badrock put the skids under the hosts, taking a standing count at 96-8. Rob Lord was joined by James Bottomley, the pair getting to 133 before Lord fell, and in tangible tension, Bottomley and last man Neel Deshpande scraped together the 19 needed, winning with three balls remaining. Sale and Timperley

were the other 100% sides, Sale
winning a low scoring tussle at
Lindow, although after Sale col-
lapsed from 95-2 to 148 all out,
hopes were not high. However, a
fine spell of aggressive quick
bowling led by Amyln Layton saw
the hosts fold for 108. Timperley
were even more comfortable at
Congleton, dodging the showers
and seeing Viraj Sorathia (58)
and Jamie Matthews (64) add
118 for the opening wkt as
Timpers' 224 was way too many
for the hosts, Nathan Brown
claiming 5-18 in their 113 run
win. Bramhall got off the mark
with a five wkt victory in a low
scoring game at Stockport Geor-
gians, as did Oulton Park after
they won by the same margin in
an entertaining tussle with Mac-
clesfield at Little Budworth, An-
drew Dufty's 6-46 the standout
performance, although Ollie
Law's 62* was equally crucial
for OP, as were half-centuries for
another former CBH player in
Andrew Metcalf, and veteran
Danny Leech. However, the man
of the day was Urmston's Liam
Marshall, who top scored with
55 in his side's 194 up at Alvan-
ley before retuning 5-24 as the
hosts crashed to 87 all out, Urm-
ston's long trip well worth it as
they got off the mark for 2023.

WK 1: APRIL 22

A thrilling finish at Brooks Drive was the standout in the opening round of Div 2 fixtures, Hale Barns just holding off a spirited Christleton recovery to claim a three-run win. Opener Johnathon Aikins made 52 on debut but HB fell away from 93-4 to 129 all out. In reply. Christleton were 62-6, but recovered to 90-6 before opener Max Dunvaband became one of five victims for Joe Cooper, stumped for 43. It was soon 94-8 but the lower order, led by Ben Dowling's 32, inched towards the victory target. As the tension grew, HB skipper James Guest bowled Dowling with just four needed to win. There were four other victories on day 1, all much more clear cut. Port Sunlight made their long trip to Cale Green worthwhile, ensuring Stockport had a tough start to life back in Div 2 as Tom Palin's 5-26 helped PS to a 75 run win. Not so far away in Poynton, the other promoted club, NE Cheshire, had an equally difficult introduction to Div 2 as they crashed to just 51 all out in the face of Cheadle Hulme's experienced attack. Skipper Jake Revnolds made almost two-thirds of his side's total, and although an inevitable defeat followed, NEC will at least be encouraged that they made CH work for the runs, taking six wkts. A more surprising batting failure at Butchers Stile as Davenham's bowling attack rolled

back the years, skittling Haslington for just 78 - the visitors were 35-7 at one stage. Back to bolster the troops. Mike Rudd made a patient 41 to seal the 25 pts with a 7 wkt win. Bollington were another side to make a disappointing start, folding for just 94 in pursuit of 147 to beat Mobberley at the Rec. Mobb's Osman Butt made a careful 51. and Will Beresford-Ince 48 as Mobb reached 94-3, but there was little else to cheer as George Hardman and Keegan Fortune both marked their Bolly bows with 3 wkts apiece. Fortune then took 80 balls to make 15 runs as Bolly's batting crumbled in the face of the ageless Abdul Aqeel (5-16) and skipper Matt Mountney (4-37). Ashton-on-Mersey (204-7) couldn't decide whether to stick or twist against a strong-looking Marple team (237-7) looking for an immediate return to Div 1. Marple having the better of the points.

WK 2: APRIL 29

Sadly it was rain which dominated the divisional programme, but **Cheadle Hulme** escaped the downpours and claimed a second successive win over **Bollington**, who have made the worst possible start to life in Div 2. Bolly's decision to field looked inspired as CH slumped to 7-3, but divisional player of the year **Adam Wilde** made

day with 7-36, Mobberley showing the inconsistency that haunted them in 2022 as they folded for just 66. Hale Barns went from 138-0 to 179-9 playing Marple, who were 67-3 when rain ended it. Port Sunlight (201) v Davenham was abandoned at halfway, and NE Cheshire's long trip to Christleton frustratingly ended in a washout, even more so as NEC had reduced the hosts to 51-8 at one stage, 92-9 the score when rain had the final say.

WK 1 - APRIL 22

The result of the opening day in Div 3 came at Hawk Green, where visitors Oakmere pulled off a superb 23 run win after themselves managing just 141. Put into bat, Oakmere were all out inside 42 overs. Slade Mitrovic's 40 proving to be the highest score of the match as HG - who only just missed out on promotion last year inexplicably struggled to get going. They lost skipper Josh Hampson to the first ball of their reply and then further wkts in clumps as they fell to 118 all out in a chastening start to 2023 for them. Ashlev's Ammad Mushtag put in a fine personal display, his 61 followed by 5 wkts as his side made it an unhappy return to the County League for Northwich, who went down by 92 runs at Ashley's attractive home. The other side returning after several years away, Heaton Mersey, fared much better, taking 13 pts from their drawn game with Upton, themselves having to regroup after their 2022 relegation. But Mersey who lurched to 28-4 before a lower order recovery led by faithful servant Hassan Rashid took them to 193-9 were within a wkt of all 25 pts as Luke Marshall's 5-19 led them to the brink of victory, the last Upton pair surviving 10 balls between them to escape. Skipper Matt Owen had earlier made a fine 74 out of 115. An egregious struggle took place at The Croft,

Warrington found run scoring no easier over at Bromborough Pool, managing just 135-9 in 50 overs against Maritime. Pat Tyrrell made 62, as did Bilal Anwar for the hosts, who won by 5 wkts. Player of the year Tom Hyslop was immediately into action for Tattenhall at Winnington Park with two wkts and three catches as the hosts made 177-8 in their allocation. With the bat it was a different story, however, Hylsop one of nine players to make single figures as Tatt were all out 100, overseas player Brett Taylor making almost half that total himself with a stylish 45. Scott Edwards was the pick of the WP attack with 6-24.

WK 2 - APRIL 29

Despite another 5-for from Kingsley's Joel Logan, Maritime's Vishal Barigela went one better, his 6-21 securing a 33 run win for the Wirral side which saw them joint top of the division along with Ashley, for whom Ammad Mushtaq again starred. He made 73, comfortably


